On November 5th 2016, in the city of Auburn, WA, the Western Washington Regiment of the Color Guard marched in its 6th Veterans Day parade. This parade is among the largest such event in the country. In 2011, when the Color Guard first participated in this event, there were only a handful of compatriots who marched. Since that time, the CG ranks have not only swelled dramatically but have also been complimented by the addition of a Fife and Drum Corps. In 2015, it all came together when the Color Guard unit was awarded the City of Auburn's "Best Non-Motorized Entry." 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The Color Guard Wants You!



Besides being a lot of fun, and a great way to form lasting friendships with other compatriots, the Color Guard is an excellent way to become an active participant in fulfilling the over-arching mission of our great organization. After all, where else but the Color Guard would you ever be given the opportunity to march in parades, participate in "Honor-Flight" homecoming welcomes for WWII veterans, post colors and congratulate new Americans at Citizenship ceremonies, honor individuals and businesses with Flag-Certificates, or teach our great American heritage to classrooms full of eager 4th and 5th graders? The answer is clearly, "nowhere."

In an effort to encourage your participation, the Color Guard would like to give you the opportunity to use a loaner uniform (hunting frock or Regimental, free of charge) until you're able to purchase your own. During this transition phase, as you "build" a uniform, the Color Guard will also provide you with helpful tips and website addresses (see pages 4-7). By the way, you needn't be a military veteran to join the ranks of these modern day "patriot soldiers." All that is required is the ability to smile, and wave a flag!

Massachusetts Regiment of Artillery, 1775-1776 "Knox's Artillery"

This regiment was formed May 19, 1775, consisting of ten companies and 417 men under command of Colonel Richard Gridley. On November 17, 1775, Colonel Henry Knox took command and held it until December 27, 1776, when he was made Brigadier General and Chief of Artillery in the Continental Army. When the Army was reorganized in 1776, this regiment became the 3rd Continental Artillery under Colonel John Crane.

During the period 1775-1776, the men wore no uniform except what they could get, but the officers adopted a blue coat faced with red and lined with white cloth. These coats were cut in any style that the individual chose as there was no regulation, but the buttons were to be gilt and the buttonholes and lace the same. The coats were cut with tight sleeves and full skirts, as a rule, following the fashion of the day.

In 1778, this regiment was known as one of the best dressed in the Army. The men then wore blue coats faced with red, and lined with white, with white cross belts, red feathers in their hats, white serge breeches and waistcoats, white linen overalls or spatterdashes.

Later they wore the regulation artillery uniform adopted for all the artillery in accordance with Washington's general order of October, 1779. This order was about the same as given above except that the coats were to be faced and lined with red, and the buttonholes bound with yellow tape for the men, and gilt for the officers. Buttons for the men were of pewter with raised letters "U. S. A." on them, at this time.

Third New York Regiment, 1775 Continental Line

This regiment, known also as the "Ulster Regiment," or "3rd Yorkers," was one of the four regiments raised by the Province of New York in the early summer of 1775, for the Continental service. These four New York regiments were brigaded under Brigadier General Montgomery and were with him in all his movements, ending in the assault of Quebec.

Each regiment had a different colored uniform coat, the distinctions in colors being as follows: 1st regt., Col. Alexander McDougall, blue, faced red. 2nd regt., Col. Goose Van Schaick, light brown, faced blue. 3rd regt., Col. James Clinton, gray, faced green. 4th regt., Col. James Holmes, dark brown, faced scarlet.

By the end of August, 1775, all the men were supplied with uniform coats, and although there was a shortage of arms, tents, and many articles of clothing, many of the men were completely equipped, as shown in the drawing, which may be described as follows:

Coarse cloth regimental coat of the colors given above, white linen cravats or stocks, waistcoats and breeches of Russia drilling, woolen home-knit stockings, low shoes, a felt hat with low crown and wide brim cocked up, knapsacks and haversacks of painted canvas, and wooden canteens.

General Montgomery was much pleased with their appearance, and is said to have remarked that they had "acquired the air of Regulars."

Many of the survivors of the Canadian Campaign of 1775-1776, both officers and men, served in different commands throughout the war.

Later these New York troops were provided with buckskin waistcoats and breeches, or overalls of wool, and woolen mittens and caps. Many also wore the rifle frock for service.

Their colors were of white, yellow, blue, and green silk.

BRINGING HISTORY TO LIFE

Mick Hersey has been a busy man...

About six months ago, he actively engaged in restoring 11 of the Oregon Trail markers that were placed by the DAR and SAR back in 1916. The skills that he used to complete the restoration process learned from Mission Restore Bronze, an Arizona company that specializes in restoring veteran's memorials throughout the southern United States. Mick taught these skills during a 2-hour class to a group of 20 volunteers from the DAR and SAR (including Art Dolan, who helped coordinate the cleaning). One of restored markers, located in Toledo, WA, was rededicated in late September in a remarkable ceremony that was attended by the mayor, townsfolk, and members of the SAR and DAR.

In mid-August, Mick participated in the NW Colonial Festival in Sequim. He was the "Town Crier" who made announcements and signaled the start of the wildly popular "Hay-Bale Presentations."

Recently, Mick participated in organizing and laying wreaths for Wreaths Across America.

Our combined SAR-DAR unit is comprised of 1) SAR & DAR banners, 2) SAR-DAR Fife & Drum Corps, 3) SAR-DAR Color Guard, 4) SAR & DAR Marching members, and added today, 5) 21 sailors carrying our historic flags. The marching unit is followed by the SAR Van and DAR vehicles carrying sister compatriots.

Sadly, this year's Auburn Veterans Day parade will be the last time that Color Guard Commander Bob O'Neal (shown below) leads the way. He will be sorely missed, but not to worry: Art Dolan will take over in Bob's place.

<u>2015</u>

After four or five years of marching under sunny – and frequently cloudy conditions – the sky opened up during the Auburn Veteran's Day Parade and dumped buckets of rain on the Color Guard. Still, it was a grand ole' time; in spite of the soggy tri-corns and wet shoes. Even the finely attired DAR ladies (Daughters of the American Revolution) braved the weather and turned out in force.

The parade on Saturday marked the 50th anniversary of Auburn's veteran's day observance. This year, there were 208 marching units – including 30 bands.







Constitution Week Ceremonies

Similar ceremonies were held throughout the state. At Mt. Tahoma High School, in Tacoma, Commander Bob O'Neal and Captain Greg Emerson attended a ceremony where 82

immigrants, from 32 countries, took the oath of citizenship.

Citizenship ceremonies frequently occur during Constitution week. These ceremonies offer the SAR Color Guard the perfect opportunity to greet the new citizens, welcome them to America, and even provide them with some understanding about how our nation came into existence.

Constitution Week: Commander's Message

"Our Founding Fathers gathered Philadelphia in the summer of 1776 to draft our Declaration of Independence from Great Britain. On July 4 of that year, a free and independent United States of America was born. After the American patriots won independence on the battlefield, our Founding Fathers met again in 1787 to draft a plan for the governing of our new nation. That plan - our Constitution - was signed on September 17, 1787, by delegates to the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia, presided over by George Washington. New Hampshire became the ninth state to ratify the document, and it was subsequently agreed that government under the U.S. Constitution would begin on March 4, 1789. For 229 years, our Constitution has proven to be an enduring guide in our quest to secure our Founding Fathers' vision of a free and democratic America.

September 17, 2016, began the national celebration of Constitution Week. We celebrate our Constitution because it recognizes and protects both the sovereignty of our nation and our sovereignty as individual Americans. Under the Constitution, our Founding Fathers crafted a form of government that would be strong enough to secure our rights against domestic and foreign oppression and yet not so strong or extensive as to be oppressive itself.

The United States Constitution Week resolution signed into Public Law #915 on August 2, 1956 by President Dwight D. Eisenhower. The aims of the celebration are to (1) emphasize citizens' responsibilities for protecting and defending the Constitution, preserving it for posterity; (2) inform the people that the Constitution is the basis for America's great heritage and the foundation for our way of life; and (3) encourage the study of the historical events which led to the framing of the Constitution in September 1787.

Constitution Week is the perfect opportunity to read and study this great document which is the safeguard of our American liberties. The Washington SAR encourages all citizens across the country to take time this week to guard that which is committed to us by our forefathers... "our freedom." Keep faith with our founding fathers and fly the American flag during the week."

- A B: The Spokane SAR Flag Museum is up and running with 60 historic flags and 25 posters. It is operated by Spokane #1 Chapter and manned by the following SAR Color Guardsmen: Vice Commander Stan Wills (Docent), Chapter President Gale Palmer, Rob Goff, John Caskey, Tom Clark, Dale Ryan, and Jim Herbert. The museum is the largest museum of its type in the Northwest. It is located at the Fairmount Memorial Park at 1402 South Pines Road, Spokane.
- C: Note from Major Stan Wills, Vice Commander WASSAR Color Guard: "Today I did a program for the Idaho CAR (Children of the American Revolution). I gave them a project to collect replica Flags for the 13 original colonies. I did a short flag program assisted by new member Rene Lebourhis. We did a fund-raising project in which I donated \$100, and with this we were able to purchase the flags and poles. I furnished everything else and used my connections to keep the project under budget. It turned out wonderful. It is a great addition the Flag Museum."
- D: Mike Moore & Denny Shaw attended the 5 Mile Prairie Days where they set up a recruiting booth. The 5 Mile Grange made a \$100 donation to the flag museum.

It started with a simple request to honor his wife's first husband.

In 1971, a gentleman asked us if he could honor his wife's first husband who passed away. His wife often talked about how proud he was to be a veteran and serve his country. Because he truly loved his wife, he wanted to help her pay tribute to her first husband's memory and service by having a large American flag fly every Memorial Day Weekend, and asked if the cemetery would do that each year. We were proud to honor his request. He purchased the flag, the pole, and a small plaque with the veteran's name on it. This flag flies every Memorial Day Weekend. Thus began the Fairmount Memorial Association's Flag Program.

Now, over 3500 flags stand guard throughout our cemeteries, honoring veterans every Memorial Day Weekend. But many flags are fading and wearing out. Some have been replaced. Many more need replacing. Would you help honor a Veteran for eternity?





Undergarments: White soldier shirt, collar, puffed sleeves, optional ruffles at throat & cuffs.

Note: Officers wear shoulder boards, and a crimson silk sash; NCO's wear epaulets, red wool sash, and a sword.

Accoutrements: Neck stock (tie), haversack, canteen, pistol or musket/bayonet or long rifle





RULES REGARDING THE WEAR OF TRADITIONAL SCOTTISH ATTIRE

During the Revolutionary War, many Americans of Scottish ancestry supported the patriot cause. In fact, 19 of the 56 delegates who signed the Declaration of Independence were Scottish-Americans. On the battlefield, those who fought the Redcoats often did so while clothed in traditional Scottish attire.

Recently, there was much discussion about whether or not Color Guard members should be allowed to march in their kilts. The following material addresses the controversy and the agreed upon solution.



As Presented, the suggested compromise actually is very close to what most supporters were seeking approval to wear. It is a good alternative.

The 1777 woodcut/image of a Georgia Scottish attire Militiaman was actually on our Georgia Patriot "Continental" money from 1777----War's end.

- Per Mark Anthony: The SAR Color Guard is a representative body and NOT historically accurate in presentation of Revolutionary War-era Militia, Army, or other supporting Revolutionary War era materials. As such, as stated, a Representation of these Patriots in question would be sufficient.
 - The kilt uniform would consist of:
 - 1) A kilt (Modern/Ancient) (long pleat or short waist pleat)
 - 2) Waist Belt to hold pleats, over or under waist coat
 - 3) Buckle shoes, boots or moccasins for foot wear
 - Stockings knee length of wool or cotton, with or without, garters or leg- buckle ties
 - 5) A colonial shirt (pull over) white checkered--raw tan cotton-etc...
 - 6) A neck sock-option, colonial waist coat, a bonnet, flop or Tricor hat
 - 7) Ancient Sporrans "only"; sewn skin-leather bags tied at the apex and attached to a waist belt (under coat), or tied around the waist These were in lieu of NO pockets on old/ancient pleat kilts or Scottish clothing.
