#### FROM OUR COLOR GUARD COMMANDER (and 4th Quarter report)

Something New: As the Washington State SAR Color Guard Commandeer, I declare the month of November as Chapter Color Guard Recognition Day (an idea I got from our AH Nov chapter meeting).\* Ok, none of you know this yet. Due to the importance of the Color Guard across the state, I believe these uniformed SAR community representatives <u>should be recognized annually</u>. No, not at the April, WASSAR meeting, but in each individual chapter. Amazing as it may sound, 25% of Washington's SAR chapters have reignited their dormant color guard.



**Mike Hutchins**, George Washington Chapter, and **Neil Vernon**, Seattle Chapter have inserted a bold new incendiary desire for color guard activity. This means new events, parades, and members! A tribute goes out to both these chapter captains for kindling a new excitement for uniformed presence in their respective communities.

\*The 17 Nov regular meeting of the Alexander Hamilton Chapter was declared Color Guard day by the President.

The Color Guard Headquarters, all Chapter Captains, and all other members of the Color Guard were invited to attend.

Representatives from half of the Washington Chapters as well as the State Color Guard Commander and 2 deputy commanders were there. At the meeting Art Dolan, the state commander, was promoted to Lt Colonel. The promotion was read by the Color Guard Adjutant, Bob O'Neal. (see page 4 for more)

It was also suggested that all Washington Chapters recognize their SAR Color Guard members.

#### The Color Guard is the face of the SAR while presenting a powerful recruiting tool in the community.

Our 61-state wide color guard members participated in 28 events, 6 parades, 125 living history presentations, ceremonies, posting of the colors, and Honor Flights, resulting in **557 uniformed appearances** throughout Washington.

Our state pride for these dedicated volunteers extends well beyond the three pillars of History, Education, and Patriotism. It is a core belief in their own heritage, and the willingness to share their ancestry within their community, drives these members to spread the story of a Revolution and those who fought in it.

If, as a Color Guard member you felt there was more activity in 2018, you are correct. Here is a history of Color Guard appearances since 2011. Please recognize, some of the CG activity may have been missed and the actual number is higher. Progression of Color Guard member appearances from 2011 - 2018:

2011 - 27	2013 - 116	2015 - 132	2017 - 295
2012 - 90	2014 - 167	2016 - 205	2018 - 557

All these appearances would not happen if all the members did not "believe". We are growing and this is reflected through the increasing number of community requests for our skills, abilities and talent. Each Chapter CG Captain is looking for new recruits. 

## 11 November was Veterans Day (But why on the 11th?)

That's when the armistice ending World War I began in 1918, and that is the origin of Veterans Day (note that it is spelled without an apostrophe), a U.S. holiday often confused with Memorial Day.

Memorial Day honors America's war dead, while Veterans Day honors all American veterans, living and dead, and has a special emphasis on thanking living veterans for their service to the country.

Why Memorial Day is different from Veterans Day

In November 1919, one year after the armistice ending World War I went into effect, President Woodrow Wilson declared Nov. 11 as the first commemoration of Armistice Day with the following words:

To us in America, the reflections of Armistice Day will be filled with solemn pride in the heroism of those who died in the country's service and with gratitude for the victory, both because of the thing from which it has freed us and because of the opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nations. . . .

In 1938, Congress made Nov. 11 an annual, legal holiday known as Armistice Day to honor the cause of world peace, but it was primarily used to honor World War I veterans. After World War II, in 1954, the law was changed, and "Armistice" was changed to "Veterans." Nov. 11 became a day to honor veterans of all American wars.

Veterans Day was moved to the fourth Monday in October in 1968 by Congress, but that was reversed in 1978 when it became obvious that Americans wanted the holiday celebrated Nov. 11.

Other facts about the holiday:

The Tomb of the Unknowns: In 1921, the United States laid to rest the remains of a World War I American soldier — his name "known but to God" — in Arlington National Cemetery in Virginia on a hillside overlooking Washington. It became known as the "Tomb of the Unknown Soldier" and was meant to symbolize reverence for the American veteran. Today it is known as the "Tomb of the Unknowns."

At 11 a.m. on Nov. 11, a color guard consisting of members of every branch of the military renders honors to America's war dead at the Tomb of the Unknowns. The president or a representative places a wreath at the tomb, and a bugler sounds taps.

And here are some key economic and demographic statistics compiled by the Census Bureau on our nation's veterans.

- **18.5 million....**The number of military veterans in the United States in 2016.
- **9.2 million.....** The number of veterans ages 65 and older in 2016.
- **1.6 million.....** The number of veterans were younger than 35 in 2016.
- **6.7 million.....** The number of Vietnam-era veterans in 2016. Moreover, there were 7.1 million who served during the Gulf War (representing service from August 1990 to present); 768,263 who served in World War II; 1.6 million who served in the Korean War; and 2.4 million who served in peacetime only.
- **14.4 million....**The number of veterans who voted in the 2016 presidential election. In that election, 69.6 percent of veterans cast a ballot, compared with 60.6 percent of nonveterans. These rates reflect the citizen voting-age population.
- **398,453.....** The number of all U.S. employer firms that are majority owned by veterans. Veteran-owned firms make up 7.2 percent of the nation's 5.5 million employer businesses.


11 Nov: Veterans Day parade, Auburn WA.

#### News from the Flag museum:

Stan Wells recently attended a program to Honor the Native Americans who served in Viet Nam and other wars who suffer from PTSD. Arnie Holt is the CEO. He travels around the state with a collection of memorabilia he has collected from various Native American Veterans. Arnie is the Color Guard Commander for funerals for Native American Veteran's Funerals. His organization donated this flag to the Flag Museum. Arnie's program is outstanding and should be seen by everyone. If you would like to contact him let me know. Stan is starting a new section in the flag museum for Native American Flags. Each tribe has its own flag



A flag was just donated to the Flag Museum by USMC retired Jeremy Armstrong. It is a WWI commemorative flag which has a Poppy on it, the symbol to wear to honor all war dead. The poppy was made famous by the poem written by Lt. Col. John McCrae in WWI, named "In Flanders Field".

#### "In Flanders Field":

In Flanders field the poppies blow between the crosses, row on row that mark our places: and in the sky the larks still bravely singing fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the dead: short days ago, We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, loved and were loved: and now we lie in Flanders Field

Take up our quarrel with the foe To you, from failing hands, we throw The torch: be yours to hold it high If ye break faith with us who die, We shall not sleep, though poppies grow In Flanders Field

**New Hats:** News from Stan - Our latest addition to the Spokane Chapter #1 uniforms. We will wear these with our vest to meetings and any other chapter functions.



**18 Oct:** New Citizen Ceremony. Stan Wills attended a New Citizen Ceremony in Spokane at the Federal Building where 28 new Citizens from 13 counties received their citizenship certificates and presented them with flag pins. These are of the families from Uganda and Mexico.

**30 Oct:** Stan Wills presented 34 new citizens from 20 countries a flag pin at the Spokane Federal Courthouse.



**11 Nov:** On the 11th hour, 11th day, 11th month, 100 years ago today the Great War ended. Today to Honor that memory, Mick Hersey, of the JPG chapter, and Stan Wills, with the help of the DAR chapters in Spokane recreated the ringing of the Bells at the Flag Museum in Spokane.





**11 Nov:** Stan Wills and Mick Hersey then drove 50 miles to Rosalia, WA to honor all Veterans with a Flag retirement ceremony and dedication of the 11th Bench provided by Julie Pittman of the DAR.



**15 Nov:** Stan Wills provided a tour of the Flag Museum to 16 Home school kids.



**16 Nov:** An original 38-Star flag, was donated to the flag museum by Edwin & Helen Harmon of Spokane. They recently moved to Spokane from Lake Stevens, WA. The flag flew at the grandparents of Edwin Harmon in Tamaqua, Schuylkill, Pa from 1876-1889. His grandparents were Harold Greenwalt and Lenora Krannch (German Immigrants). The flag was handed down to Edwin who mounted it in the frame. Edwin recently passed away and Helen wanted it to be placed in the Flag Museum. Estimated value of the flag is \$1500-\$2500. I was given documentation to verify where it came from. It now fly's in the flag museum under an original 48-star flag that flew in WWII.

The flag was used when Washington was just a territory. When Washington became a state in 1889, 5 states were added, WA., ID., MT., SD., and ND. This created a 43-star flag on July 4th, 1890.


Many stopped by our booth to talk to us and we received several inquiries about how to join.
