From Our Color Guard Past Commander

End of Term Summary, Washington State Color Guard Commander 2017-2019

Nearing the close of my term as Color Guard Commander reflection on the state of our organization reveals remarkable changes over the past 24 months.

Our national accomplishment for the year occurred just prior to our annual 2019 WASSAR meeting in Olympia. Each year three Color Guard members are selected to post the colors in the Olympia, House of Representatives. This year the Color Guard was represented by **Stan Wills**, Spokane Chapter #1, **Dick Motz**, Alexander Hamilton Chapter. And **Jan Lemmer**, Drummer. The individual photograph of Compatriot Lemmer was so patriotic it was selected as the cover of the Fall issue of the NSSAR Colorguardsman magazine. Significant activity increases were seen in Spokane Chapter #1, George Washington Chapter, Seattle Chapter, John Paul Jones Chapter, Mid-Columbia Chapter and the Alexander Hamilton Chapter. Over the past two years we have increased our outreach in Parade participation, community historical presentations, and presence in the public schools. All resulting with increased visibility and membership.



Seattle chapter (**Neil Vernon**) and George Washington Chapter (**Leland Hutchins**) have shown explosive color guard growth while John Paul Jones and Alexander Hamilton have dramatically increased their presence in our respective school districts. We all know that public and private schools are difficult to penetrate however through positive presupposition and gregarious personalities our long term efforts have paid off.

John Paul Jones presence and organization at the Pacific Northwest Colonial Festival in Port Angeles, WA, has dramatically increased our visibility on the Olympic Peninsula promoting SAR interest resulting in new memberships. Under the Leadership of Color Guard Captain **Fred Gilbert**, the John Paul Jones booth provides historical "Hay Bale" presentations on timely Revolutionary topics. The mission of History, Education and Patriotism is deeply imbedded in each of the John Paul Jones volunteers at the festival.

Spokane Chapter #1 is continuing to show significant Eastern Washington presence using a multi prong approach through parades, school/community presentations, new citizen Naturalization ceremonies and honoring veterans at the return of Honor Flights. Their Color Guard is always at the ready, often with just a few days' notice to participate in community events. They are the personification of "Minutemen" at the ready.

Eastern Washington is fortunate enough to have the Mid-Columbia chapter also exhibiting a strong presence in south central Washington. Continuing to add to their "Patriot Chest" presentation and the addition of "Medicine in the Revolution", new interest and membership is growing from their efforts.

From the top down there was a change in the 2019 Color Guard Command. The responsibility for receiving and fulfilling color guard requests changed from the Washington State Color Guard Commander to the individual Chapter Color Guard Captains. The change in decision making streamlined requests for activity acceptance or denial to the local chapter. With only a few glitches, the transition was well received by the Chapter CG Captains.

Let us not forget all the chapter presidents and color guard captains who faithfully submit articles to the NSSAR periodicals highlighting chapter activities each and every quarter. If you chapter has not made a submission please consider finding a member for this role.

One of the most notable contributions to WASSAR is the [Color Guard web page](#) created by Compatriot **Dick Motz**. Dick has personally added Event links for all upcoming activities including maps, parking and a direct link to the event home page answers the 5 W's members traditionally ask before an event. Dick has also created Information and Data links providing easy access to such topics as Color Guard Medals and requirements, Uniform sources/prices, Color Guard Newsletter, and your own downloadable table to keep track of all your personal event participation as you move toward medal achievement. If you have any questions regarding activity in other chapters, Dick has also completed the Color Guard Directory, the first ever, to include names and photos of color guard members state wide. If you have a new member to your chapter's color guard, please send a photo and the correct spelling of the members name. It will be posted online.

IMPORTANT: We are living in historic times here in Washington and all color guardsmen are part of it. We have witnessed the creation of the WASSAR Color Guard through the sheer determination of Stan Wills (Eastern Washington) and Bob O'Neal (Western Washington). The origin of the first WASSAR Fife and Drum Corps by Viren Lemmer, along with the first ever Washington State NSSAR annual conference in 2021. We are a vibrant organization and **YOU** are part of this. This year's group of Color Guard Captains are the first to have assumed the increased role for color guard participation in your chapter region.

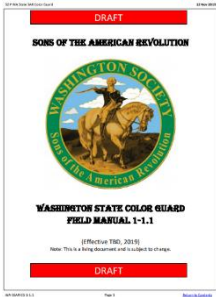

The Native American Moment

Native Americans at Bunker Hill

Native Americans fought alongside of the Colonist at the Battle of Bunker Hill. The Battle saw the gallant participation of at least 15 Indian soldiers, including members of the Mashpee Wampanoag, Hassanamisco, Nipmuc, Tunxis, Mohegan, and Pequot tribes. Among those were Joseph Paugenit (Mashpee), Ebenezer Ephraim (Hassanamisco), John Wampee (Tunxis), and Jonathan Occum & Samuel Ashbow (Mohegan). Rebecca Tanner (Mohegan) had two sons killed at Bunker Hill and eventually lost all 5 sons fighting in the Rev War. The Indians were responsible for guarding the East rail fence. When they ran out of Powder they fought with tomahawks and knives until they were killed by overwhelming British soldiers. They were buried in a mass grave at Bunker Hill (Breed's Hill) and small plaque was placed there to honor their sacrifice.

Despite such losses, most Indians believed their contribution to an American Victory would improve their situation. But despite their sacrifice and commitment, the Indians were no better off than they had been before the war. Despite risks taken and lives lost during the Rev War, the native Americans continued to be relegated to second-class citizens. They could not vote, and tribal lands continued to be taken away from their control. The phrase "all men are created equal" applied only to white patriots, not to "Patriots of Color".

Inland has been doing this for 10 years and it never gets old. So far, in the last 10 years they have sent 2000 Veterans back to Washington DC to see the Memorials built in their honor. The cost is about \$1000 per veteran. That totals to 2 million dollars they have raised to date. Inland has enough money to continue for two more years and they continue to raise funds. They hope is that this will continue for a long time to come.



This flight consisted of 7 WWII, 18 Korean, and 70 Viet Nam Vets. This included four women vets. If you are a Veteran, combat or not, sign up, you earned it.

17 & 29 Oct: New Citizens Ceremony. Stan Wills presented pins to 29 new citizens from 18 countries on 17 Oct and 28 new citizens from 16 new countries on 29 Oct. Both ceremonies were held at the Federal Courthouse in Spokane.



24 Oct: The SAR, DAR, and Home Depot worked to create a new WW1 Memorial dedicated to men who fought in WW1.

This Memorial is located on the Corner of Argonne and Empire in Spokane Valley. Argonne street was named for the Battle in the Argonne Forest in WW1. Our funding goal has now been met and we will soon complete the project with the addition of an Eagle, Flag Pole and the original WW1 plaque from 1922.

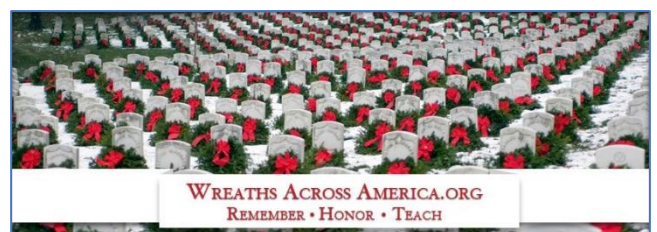

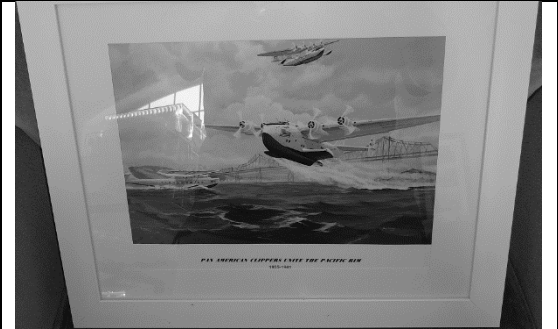

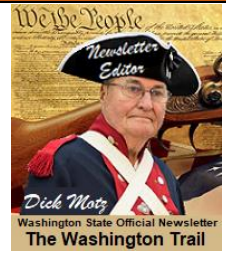

Publication Schedule: Publish four times a year (after each BOD meeting).

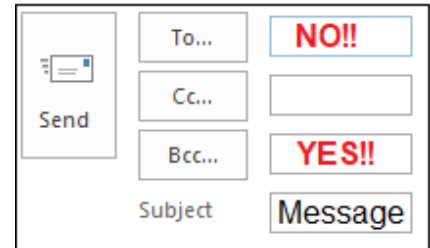

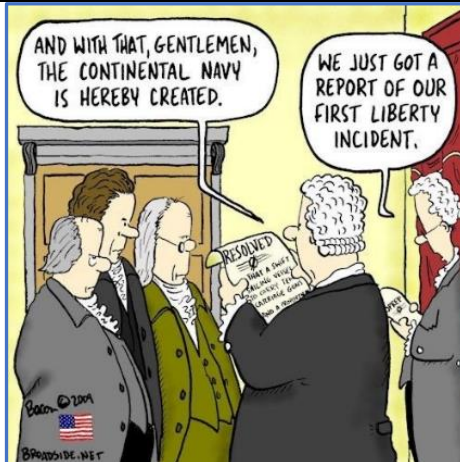
Worth Repeating - Security Risk!!!

Because of what I do with the SAR, I receive a lot of E-Mail messages. All too often they are from someone that has used a distribution list and placed it in the **TO: Box** when they sent the message. This causes all the Address in the distribution list to be displayed on the incoming message. **Not a good idea.**

A better way to address a message if sending to more than 3 or 4 people (distribution list) is to put the distribution list in the **BCC: Box**. This will prevent the display of confidential addresses to display if the message is forwarded on to someone outside of the SAR. *The Editor*



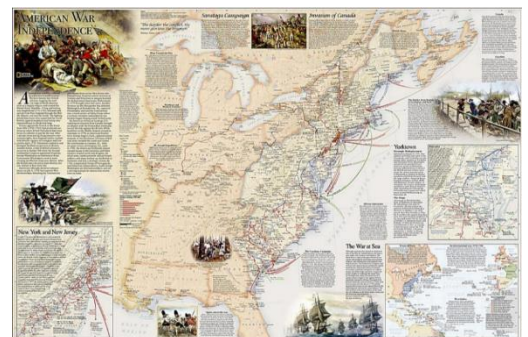
