
I hope you had a great summer and are now ready to resume our SAR activities! Despite the break from chapter meetings, it has been a busy summer.

Help Make a Quilt of Valor

Greetings Compatriots,

As the 2019 – '20 Society State President, I bring greetings from the Children of the American Revolution! I am the daughter of a 21-year U.S. Navy veteran, who served in the First Gulf War. I believe that every service member and veteran - man or woman - should be recognized, thanked, and honored for his or her patriotic service, to this wonderful nation.

For my state project, I am working with Quilts of Valor (QOV), a national non-profit organization that connects private citizens to support members of the active armed forces, reserves, and veterans, to give them comforting tokens of appreciation for their military service.

Catherine Roberts, the mother of a U.S. Army service member deployed to Iraq, who had a vivid dream, started QOV in 2003. She saw a young man sitting on the side of his bed in the middle of the night,

hunched over. The permeating feeling was one of utter despair. She could see his war demons clustered around, dragging him down into an emotional abyss. Then, as if viewing a movie, she saw him in the next scene wrapped in a quilt. His whole demeanor had changed from one of despair to one of hope and wellbeing. The quilt had made this dramatic change. The message of the dream was Quilts = Healing.

The foundation's model is very simple – A volunteer team donates their time and materials to make a quilt. One person would piece the top and the others would quilt it. In the 16-years QOV has operated, the organization has created over 200,000 individually created, handmade quilts for active duty military members and veterans.

Their mission statement is "To cover service members and veterans touched by war, with comforting and healing Quilts of Valor" Each quilt takes about \$250.00 in materials to create. I am raising money to provide QOV with the materials for twelve (or more) quilts and my fundraising goal is \$3,000.00. Would you consider partnering with me in this worthy cause?

The Tennessee State Library and Archives

The Tennessee State Library and Archives has just launched a Revolutionary War veterans' digital project, "Patriot Paths."

Tennessee State Library and Archives' new Revolutionary War project (https://sos.tn.gov/tsla)

Thousands of veterans flooded into Tennessee at the conclusion of the war, and about 2,000 pension files exist for those who came here. Since most of the soldiers were not eligible for a pension until they were in their 80s, the number who received a pension was relatively small compared to the number who served.

Staff and interns at the Library & Archives pored over those pension files to find the dates and places where the soldiers were born, married, enlisted and died. Soldiers who had been born throughout the colonies and even Europe ultimately made their way to Tennessee. After the war, many crossed the mountains from Virginia and North Carolina, but some came from as far away as New York and Massachusetts.

That information was added to a database and then coordinated with GIS mapping software. The result is Patriot Paths, where historians and genealogists can search for veterans and study the patterns of migration.

"Patriot Paths uses modern mapping tools to tell the stories of those who fought to secure independence at the time of our nation's founding," Secretary of State Tre Hargett said. "I'm proud of the continued efforts of the Library & Archives to find innovative ways to make records like these more accessible."



Warning: Political Storms Are Here!

When I was younger, political campaigns started at the beginning of the year in which the election was being held. Not so anymore; now the campaigns begin long before that.

We are already in the midst of the 2020 Presidential election campaign, and state and local races are heating up as well. This is a good time to remind Washington SAR members of how to treat politics while participating in an SAR event or conducting SAR business.

As stated in the SAR *Official Handbook* (Vol. III Membership, Compliance & Other Policies, pp. 11-13), the SAR is tax-exempt organization under Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code. This means that it "cannot be an action organization, i.e., it may not attempt to influence legislation as a substantial part of its activities and it may not participate in any campaign activity for or against political candidates.

State Societies, Chapters, and Compatriots must be mindful of the above restrictions and conduct SAR operations in a manner that preserves and protects the SAR's tax-exempt status for everyone's benefit."

The *Handbook* makes clear that the SAR is a non-political organization:

State Societies and Chapters must never endorse or recommend any candidate for public office, *nor may meetings include the discussion of merits or demerits of such candidates*. The merit of any public question involving the social, economic, moral, or physical welfare of the people may be fairly and intelligently studied and discussed at a meeting for the enlightenment of those attending. SAR may take a position on any bill or measure, which may be submitted to a vote of the elected representatives of the people or to the vote of the people.

We always need to treat each other in a civil and courteous way. Our meetings and activities should avoid the same subjects as at a tavern: religion and politics. We come together to promote the SAR's patriotic, historical, and educational goals, not to argue or berate each other about political parties or candidates.

Let us keep our meetings, activities and communications free of politics, and focus on our mission. With your help, we will survive the next 12 months and all still be compatriots.

Minuteman Award Presented

8 July 2019, Costa Mesa, CA: During the 129th annual SAR Congress, Compatriot Jim Lindley was awarded the highly prized Minuteman Award. The Minuteman Award is the most prestigious award of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution. Only those Compatriots who have made distinguished and exceptional contributions of service to the National Society may be recognized. The award has been presented annually since 1952. Since 1967, a maximum of six awards may be presented each year. This year's class was: Michael Elston (VA), Jim Faulkinbury (CA), Larry Leslie (KY), Jim Lindley (WA), J. Thomas Showler, (PA) and William O 'Bill' Stone (AL)

Being escorted to the front of the auditorium where he was inducted by President General



Warren Alter, Compatriot Lindley took his place among the organization's Minutemen. The honor was well deserved. His citation read as follows:

"Compatriot Lindley has served the National Society as Vice President General of the Pacific District. He has also served as a National Trustee for six terms and as a member of the Executive Committee, and five terms on the Nominating Committee. Compatriot Lindley has served on the following committees: the George S. and Stella M. Knight Essay Committee for six years, serving as Vice Chairman for three of those years and Chairman for three years; the Membership Committee for five years; the Congress Planning Committee for three years; the Council of Youth Awards for four years, and the NSSAR Fundraising Committee for two years, serving as Chairman for both of those years. He secured a cell site marketing agreement to benefit the SAR monetarily. Compatriot Lindley is the first line sponsor on forty-four new members and assisted in organizing two Chapters in the Washington SAR. He has attended seven Congresses and fifteen National Leadership Meetings. He is a George Washington Fellow, and a contributor to the JROTC Endowment Fund; the George S. & Stella M. Knight Essay Contest, and the SAR Center for Advancing America's Heritage."

Jim is only the fourth Washingtonian since 1952 to receive this honor. He follows in the footsteps of **Lewis A. Smith** (1952), **Jean A. Hibbard** (1958), and **John C. Ellingson** (2010). Through 2019, only four hundred and six Compatriots have received the Minuteman Award.

On hand to witness and celebrate his accomplishment were his wife, Teri, and fellow compatriots Keith Weissinger, Rob Sexton, Jim Doughty, Tim Doughty, Gregory Lucas and his wife, Cindy, Tony Abbott and his wife, Charlotte, Stefan Kovalenko, Ken Betterton, and VPG-elect Ken Roberts.

Jim's honors follow close on the heels of his having been named as a Kentucky Colonel.

Let's all join in congratulating Jim for serving our Society so well, and for restoring Washington to its rightful place in the limelight. Well done, Jim!

The SAR Minuteman Award is the highest award presented to a member by the SAR. It is presented for distinguished service rendered to the SAR on the national level. Members are selected by the SAR's Minuteman Committee, made up of previous medal recipients and appointed by the SAR President General. The medal is presented by the President General at an annual Congress. It is not presented in absentia. The Minuteman Award was authorized in 1952 and, beginning in 1968, the medal is awarded to no more than six recipients every year. It is awarded to individual members on a one-time basis.

WA State Trustee Report (Update)

- Software: A check scanning device was approved for deposits at the cost of \$50 per month
- Mission Data Website Data Base: The new data base will be rolled out soon. When this happens use your national number and date of birth to sign in. You will be asked to form a password and when you do write it down and do not set up more than one password or you will have more than one sign in. You will have to call Mike Scroggins to correct that problem. There will be a dashboard to update your medals and awards. This will not be rolled out until all the bugs are out. Coming soon.
- Membership: 35,975--15 weeks for supplementals and 8 weeks for applications. Forty-eight memorials were sold.
- Headquarters: The executive office is complete. A new library person has been hired and an assistant for Sarah Dennison the Director of Fundraising.
- Center for Advancing Americas Heritage: (Museum) A content video has been distributed and should be shown to chapters to see what is planned. FYI the ship has sailed on this project, so it is going to happen. Phase 2 part 3 is under way. \$780,000 was needed for this is it now down to \$600,000 needed. New Liberty Tree Campaign is coming in the mail to a mailbox near you soon. Phase three is the buildout of the Center.
- Application forms: Well if you like the long form of application it will be going away by Fall Leadership. We presently have 5 form for applications. The computer form will be the only form by fall. This is a Single Application Online Deadline.
- Strategic planning: National is working on National Dues Collection. All dues including state and chapter will be done by national. Chapter increases and state increased will be passed to national for collection. This is in the planning stage. 30 60- and 90-day warnings for member to pay dues. Also, Perpetual Memberships are being

considered. Twenty times dues cover members for 20 years and grandpa can pay junior dues in advance to keep juniors in the society. (all this is in the planning stage)

- Hillsdale Release: The Hillsdale release form for the Americas Founding Document project was sent to the committee.
- Budget: 2020 budget income projection 1,986,818 out 1,686,700 for 292,200 after transfers for debt pay down and other transfers we net 7918. This is about the same for 2019. We are a nonprofit, so we need to spend what we take in. So, we show a small profit.
- Two-year terms and other Indiana Bylaws: Two-year terms and other Indiana Society bylaws all failed or were pulled.
- Officers Elected: New PG is Jack Manning and the only contested race was for Registrar. Douglas Collins was elected. The new WA Trustee is Keith Weissinger with Bob Doughty Alternate. AK Trustee Jim Lindley with Tim Doughty Alternate. OR Trustee John Berg with Greg Lucas Alternate. VPG Pacific Ken Roberts.
- Minuteman: A WA member was honored as a Minuteman. Jim Lindley

- Compatriots assembled in Ellensburg Washington, President Craig Lawson called the meeting to order at 1000. Seventeen members provided a quorum to conduct Washington SAR business. President Lawson reported he had attended the Northshore Veterans Memorial Dedication Ceremony, the Mary Fell Stevenson Chapter DAR Flag Retirement Ceremony, and three chapter meetings. He will be attending the SAR Fall Leadership Meeting in September.
- Flag Respect and Recognition Chairman Russ Oliver presented streamers and pins to state Chapters for participation in the program. Fort Vancouver received the first-place award. The members were reminded that state-level awards may be presented and a request for potential recipients was made. - Compatriot Greg Lewis reported that the 2021 Congress Planning Committee has been very busy both here and at this year's Congress. The team designed a shirt for wear at the Congress, which was well received and was an outstanding advertisement for the 2021 Congress. Our Ladies Auxiliary supported an information table at the Congress selling Challenge Coins and messenger bags, which raised \$1,445. The donations supporting the 2021 Congress are now \$28,160, one third of the anticipated cost of hosting the Congress. President Lawson will send a request for additional donations in September. - Compatriots in the Olympia area wish to establish a new Chapter. The Membership and Chapter Support committee will provide information and assistance with establishment of the new Chapter.

- The meeting was adjourned at 1430.

Keith Weissinger, of the Alexander Hamilton Chapter, recently had the honor to serve as a "**Person Guardian**" with his friend Charles V. "Chuck" Cook in Washington DC as part of the **Honor Flight Program**. Veterans represented service in World War II, Korea, and Vietnam. Some served in more than one war and, in the case of Chuck Cook, all three! With the help of his mother, Chuck forged his birth certificate and at the age of 16 joined the army in May of 1946. This began a career that spanned 24 years in the military.

The mission of Puget Sound Honor Flight is "To transport our heroes on One Last Mission", a trip to Washington, D.C. to visit and reflect at the memorials built in their honor. This trip is free to the veteran, and made possible solely through individual donations and corporate support. No Federal funds are allocated to this program. Over 180,000 veterans have made this cathartic journey.

During a busy weekend, the veterans have the opportunity to visit a multitude of memorials and receive

recognition for their service from a grateful nation. From the beginning of the journey they are treated with the respect and appreciation they so richly deserve. This was especially heartfelt by the Vietnam veterans, many of whom originally returned home to jeers and insults. With this journey and return, Puget Sound Honor flight attempts to atone for that past disrespect. During the journey, each veteran is accompanied by a Person Guardian. The Guardian serves as a personal attendant to provide any assistance that might be needed. Many of our older veterans need assistance with transfers or require wheelchairs for mobility. Guardians serve in any capacity necessary to allow the veteran to experience each memorial in an up-close and individual manner. However, their first and most important role is that of friend.

- The Chapter Executive Committee meeting is scheduled for 9 Sep to plan events for the coming nine Chapter meetings.



John Tipton interviewed Russ Wentworth, a WWII Veteran, about his experiences for the Library of Congress, "Veterans History" project. Kelly Schultz videotaped the interview and Larry Flint attended. Karen Schultz will edit the video and Larry will be filling out the forms for the project. A link will be provided for on-line access to the interview.

WWII Veteran Russ Wentworth talking about his wartime experiences.

Russ was born and raised in Illinois where he was part of the Victory Corps in high school (perhaps similar to JROTC). After receiving his draft notice on graduation day, he went into the Army. Following basic training at Fort Knox, KY, he went to war on the Queen Mary, a luxury liner converted to a troop ship. The destination was Glasgow, Scotland and then by train & ferry to Europe. He walked most of Russ Wentworth



the way to Paris, and then boarded boxcars for Luxembourg, where he joined the 712th Tank Battalion for action at the Battle of the Bulge. The 712th Tank Battalion, worked together with the 90th Infantry Division, part of General Patton's Third Army. The weather was severely cold but being in a tank, he was able to keep warm and his boots dry. In one of the great moves of the war, Patton turned the Third Army's axis of advance through ninety degrees and set it upon the south of the German forces. By January 1945, the remainder of the process of closing up to the Rhine could be completed. Vicious fighting took place, including the Battle of the Ardennes but by April, there was but one great natural barrier, the Rhine River. They won the bridgehead and Third Army embarked on another great eastward dash. In May, they liberated the Mauthausen-Gusen concentration camps. The Third Army spent 281 days of incessant victorious combat, their penetrations advanced further in less time than any other army in history.



JULY 4th, 1925 - PARADE PHOTO

From the 1920's until at least 1963, the Seattle Chapter marched in the Seattle Fourth of July Parade. The Chapter rented Revolutionary War uniforms from Brocklind's Costume Company, at the time located in Seattle at Ninth & Olive, now at Fifth and East Pike. The Seattle Chapter even had a float for the parade in the early 1930's.

During those years, the Seattle Chapter was basically *the* State Society. The other chapters were very small in numbers, whereas Seattle had 90+ members. This due to the fact that the Alexander Hamilton Chapter had folded, staying so for 50 years, and the membership transferred to Seattle. The photo is from the WASSAR Historian Archives.



A Message from NSSAR Education Committee Chairman, Brooks Lyles (reprint)

The requirement to receive the **President General's Education Outreach Streamer** is for the compatriots of a chapter to do a certain number of new Historical Presentations or to present an existing presentation in a new venue or to a new audience. Examples of Historical Presentations would be speaking on a Revolutionary War Battle or Campaign; a significant Personality or Founding Father; a political event or process; life as a soldier (uniforms, weapons, camp life, etc.); life as a colonist (clothing, money, community and religion, etc.); life on the frontier (clothing, Native American relations, living conditions, etc.); life as an indentured servant or as a slave; period flags; period music, etc. It should be left to the chapter Education Team Leader and the State Education Outreach Coordinator to make the call on what constitutes an appropriate presentation. A new venue or audience is just that. If you have a presentation you have done for your chapter and go do it for another chapter, the local DAR Chapter or the Lions Club those are new venues. If you have a class you do for the local 5th Grade Class every year then that is a new audience every year.

The number of presentations required is based on the size of the chapter. The larger the chapter the more presentations required to earn the streamer. The reason is that a larger chapter has more compatriots who can give presentations and therefore more opportunities than the smaller chapters.

The objective of the PG's Program is to recognize those chapters who are taking education outreach to the American people and raising the profile of the SAR in their communities.

Program Streamer Requirements:

- Chapter with less than 41 Members: 3 Presentations
- Chapters with 41 to 80 Members: 4 Presentations
- Chapters with 81 to 120 Members: 5 Presentations
- Chapters with more than 120 Members: 7 Presentations

In order to be considered for streamers Chapters must have their information submitted to the Education Director <u>Colleen Wilson</u> or Education Committee Chairman <u>Brooks Lyles</u>, via email, no later than 10 June annually.

You can download a form for recording and reporting your Education Outreach Events or you can simply send me an email with the pertinent details included. We have a lot of reports already and it is not my intent to add another task to your already crowded days. However, we do want to recognize those chapters that are doing the things that the National Society encourages! Warm Regards, Brooks Lyles



Native Americans in the Revolutionary War

Battle of Barren Hill May 1778

George Washington's army was preparing to leave Valley Forge, he sent Lafayette with 2000 militia & 47 Oneida Indian Warriors, to scout for any movement of General Howe's British movements near Philadelphia. When Lafayette arrived at Barren Hill, half way between Valley Forge & Philadelphia, he set up a defensive position.



The British had learned from spies and deserters of Lafayette's plans and sent 8000 troops to capture Lafayette and attack Washington while the Continental Congress was convened nearby. The British launched a three prong attack. At the sight of British troops, the militia retreated without firing a shot. Lafayette sent the 47 Oneida warriors to protect the rear guard retreat.

Yelling war hoops and attacking the British head on, the Oneida warriors startled the British advance guard. The British retreated and attempted to regroup not knowing how many troops they were facing. This gave Lafayette time to retreat and Washington time to set up a defensive blocking position. Six Oneida Indians were killed in the rear guard action. The actions by the Oneida warriors saved Lafayette, Washington and the Continental Congress from being captured. If captured this would have ended the war. In 1825 when Lafayette returned to Barren Hill, he held a special celebration with the Oneida tribe and thanked them for their sacrifices. He called them the "Forgotten Allies".

The Hill was later renamed Lafayette Hill and a plaque has been placed there to commemorate the sacrifices of the Oneida Warriors.


