Washington State SAR President's Message - Fall 2019 (4th Quarter)

Compatriots, Veteran's Day Ceremony

I had the honor of participating in the annual Veteran's Day Ceremony co-sponsored by our Cascade Centennial Chapter at Sunset Hills Memorial Park in Bellevue. The ceremony began at 11:00 AM (World War I, the original source of what we called Armistice Day until 1954, ended at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month). The host was Cascade Centennial Chapter Compatriot Maj. Gen. Richard Paul (ret.). During the ceremony, I awarded an SAR Good Citizenship Medal to an amazing veteran, Maj. Joseph Crecca (ret.). Joe was an Air Force First Lieutenant flying his 87th mission in Vietnam in 1969 when he was shot down and taken prisoner by the North Vietnamese. He spent the next four years in the infamous "Hanoi Hilton" POW system. Since retiring from the Air Force, Joe has spent the last 19 years sharing his Vietnam experience with various audiences across the country. Joe has also participated on planning committees for many



events honoring veterans, like Wreaths Across America and Veteran's Day ceremonies. He was also a key member of an allveteran team that restored a decaying Boeing B-52G Stratofortress that became the centerpiece of the Vietnam Air War Veterans Memorial at Boeing Field's Museum of Flight.

The program focused on honoring our veterans, particularly those from the Vietnam War, who were often very poorly treated by their countrymen upon their return. Vietnam War veterans in attendance were awarded a special pin for recognition of their service, given to them by officers from the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force, Coast Guard, National Guard, POW/MIA, and Police and Fire Departments. Gold Star Wives and Mothers were also recognized. It was a very moving ceremony and I thank the Cascade Centennial Chapter for allowing me to participate.

Christmas Gift?

If you're still looking for a Christmas gift for that Revolutionary War history buff in your family (or for yourself!), I highly recommend the new book by Rick Atkinson, *The British Are Coming: The War for America, Lexington to Princeton, 1775–1777.*" It's the first volume of a trilogy Atkinson is writing on the War for Independence. Atkinson's previous work was a three-volume history of America's World War II fighting in Europe, the Liberation Trilogy: *An Army at Dawn; The War in North Africa, 1942–1943, The Day of Battle; The War in Sicily and Italy 1943–1944,* and *The Guns at Last Light; The War in Western Europe, 1944–1945.* Atkinson was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for History for *An Army at Dawn.*

Mission: The SAR National Congress will be held in July in Renton, WA. As the host society, we need to provide two things for the Congress: our time and our money. We can contribute our time by volunteering to help at the Congress itself. We need 52 volunteers during the Congress. If you live outside the Seattle area, we will try to arrange home stay to make it easier for you to volunteer. We can also donate money to underwrite the Saturday night reception and dinner, which our society is hosting at the Museum of Flight.

Special 2021 Note from our President: The Louisiana Society has created a special medal honoring one of their Spanish Revolutionary Hero's. It is called the Galvez Medal set. Regular and Miniature are being offered for total of \$40 including postage. You can order them directly from their Society website at <u>www.lassar.org</u>. I have asked the Louisiana Society to help support our National Congress in Washington and thought it only fair to promote their Galvez Medals since we have quite a few members in our District with Spanish heritage. I recommend you review their website to see if there are any ideas you may want to consider.

Update: 2021 National Congress Planning Committee, Update - 24 Oct 2019

The Planning Committee for the 2021 SAR National Congress continues to meet monthly. Progress has been positive and steady. We are well on track in terms of venues, logistics, and materials. However, we will need your aggressive and total support to put us over the top.

From the outset, it was known the implementation of a National Congress by a relatively small state society would be a bold endeavor. Courage and vision were applied and now this project is well underway and succeeding. Critical to the completion of this undertaking will be volunteers and money. To date, spending has been in line with budget projections and funds are available to cover current obligations. However, more funds are needed as we move into the final year of preparation. To that end, the Committee will be approaching the Chapters for financial support. A variety of fund-raising options is also being considered. The Committee firmly believes the financial goals are achievable, but not without the support of the Chapters and the Members.

Likewise, volunteers will be lifeblood of this Congress. National and international visitors will travel to Washington, many for the first time. We, as hosts, want to provide them with a memorable, stress-free experience. The Committee estimates at least fifty volunteers will be needed to complete a successful Congress. Organization and sign-up is beginning now. Many of the roles are quite easy and even enjoyable. Your help with this Congress is essential.

Now for some of the fun details. The Washington Society's Host Reception will be held at the Museum of Flight. Guests will be able to tour the museum during the day followed in the evening by a seated dinner beneath the SR-71 Blackbird jet. Dress shirts and tote bags have been purchased and embroidered with the Congress logo. Planning is well underway to provide a cruise to Alaska on Holland America for attendees who wish to extend their visit. Two tours to Tillicum Village, a Mariners baseball game, Pike Place Market, Chihuly Glass Museum, and the Space Needle are among the activity offerings for our guests.

The Committee is considering utilizing computers and bar coding to streamline the registration and tour process. We request anyone with knowledge in this area contact the Committee. Your services will be well rewarded. (Hint: chocolate.)

Please know that many people are working very hard behind the scenes. Countless decisions have already been made. Numerous details have been discussed. The dream is happening and this Congress will be pride of the Washington Society. Please join us on this journey and get involved in this rare opportunity. You are the SAR and the world is coming to visit.

Update: 2021 National Congress Planning Committee, Update – 20 Nov 2019

The 2021 National Congress Planning Committee met again on 20 November 2019. Planning is generally going well and many items have been completed. Fundraising remains a high priority and we are beginning to receive some additional contributions. Annual pledges are trickling in so remember to honor your pledge before the year's end to qualify for the 2019 charitable contribution on your tax return. Two of the Chapters have pledged large contributions in addition to contributions made by individual members. One Chapter has agreed to match member contributions up to a specified limit. We challenge all the Chapters to do likewise. To those who have contributed already, please accept our profound thanks. You will be appropriately recognized.

The host reception is set and confirmed for the Museum of Flight. Likewise, the tour to Tillicum Village is in place. Jim Lindley is working hard with a local company to provide additional tours. Among the options under consideration are wine tours, trips to the Aquarium and Pike Place Market, and city tours. We also welcome other suggestions for ways to introduce our guests to the great Pacific Northwest.

Our official Congress messenger bags, black collared embroidered shirts for the volunteers, and embroidered aprons for the Hospitality volunteers have been approved, ordered, and received. The second order of Congress Challenge Coins was shipped on November 20th and receipt is due any day. For those of you wanting Challenge Coins and Congress medals, I urge you to take advantage of buying them when they are available. They sell out quickly, so do not put off your decision to buy them when you can. Several medal sets are still available for purchase. More green polo shirts have been ordered and may be available for purchase at the Annual meeting.

The Committee is seeking an incredible voice to sing the National Anthem at a Mariners ball game. We are working on having the Honor Guard post the colors at Congress, with the Color Guard lining the first and third baselines. Our President General will throw out the opening pitch. In any event, we need someone with a strong and beautiful voice to fill that massive stadium. We also are in need of a truly impressive Congress website. If you have talent in this regard, please contact the Committee.

The Committee has chosen the official coffee for the Congress. After some tasting and consideration, we have chosen Brazil Dark Roast Coffee by the Camano Island Coffee Roaster Company. We will attempt to acquire a one-pound bag for each of the host reception tables.

The Committee will have its next meeting in January, but hard work continues behind the scenes. We encourage all members of the Washington Society to attend the 2021 National Congress in Renton on 7-15 July 2021 and join in the fun and celebration.

It is time to renew that annual membership or subscribe for the first time.

Friends of the Library Life Membership monies are deposited 60/40 in the Library Endowment Fund and Library Special Purpose Operating Fund respectively.

The Franklin Flyer Awards are National awards to the four state societies, depending on size, with the largest recruitment of Friends of the Library as a percentage increase of Friends of the Library members as compared to the State Society's total membership as of December 31 of each year. These awards are presented at the annual SAR Congress.


Businessman Receives Honor

Patriot Research System

Back in August, John Kraft, of the GW chapter, was invited to become a volunteer to work with the SAR Patriot Research System for the State of Washington. He felt this to be a logical tie-in to his job as Chapter Genealogist/Registrar, so He accepted. The system database requires continual updating to enter the lineage information for each SAR member, link that member to his Patriot ancestor(s), and ensure the accuracy of each Patriot record, including Cemetery information, if available. The system is accessible to all members at this link: <u>https://www.sar.org/genealogy/patriot-research-system</u>. Previously, there was only one volunteer for the state of Washington, and that volunteer was recently elected as the SAR Pacific District Vice President, and just does not have the time available to keep up with this activity, which is a "work in progress".

Two reports are available 1) Shows the percentages of applications and patriot records that have been updated for each chapter as of August 5th and today (9/23), 2) List of GWC members (past & present) that were <u>not indexed</u> to their patriots in the database as of Aug 12 (23 members), and today, Sep 23 (2 members). **Contact John Kraft if interested.**

John is not only updating GWC, but is chipping away at the other chapters, although GWC is his first priority, and as new members and supplemental applications are added, he will update those as soon as they are available.

This system is also, where Patriot Biographies are located. There are currently only six biographies entered for the GWC. John strongly encourages every member to submit a short biography of his Patriot ancestor. They can be emailed directly to John Kraft or Mike Hutchins in WORD format. John will streamline the process and get them entered.

Daughters Of American Revolution Reaches One Million Members!!!

The Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) is a women's service organization whose members can trace their lineage to an individual who contributed to securing American independence during the Revolutionary War. More than one million total members have now joined the organization since its founding in 1890. Tisbury Manor Chapter of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, based in Monson, has welcomed 111 members since the chapter began on Nov. 14, 1952. Tisbury Manor is excited to join the national society in celebrating this milestone by spotlighting members of the chapter through the years.

Founding Chapter Regent Genevieve Jackson Beckwith organized the chapter in 1952 with 15 charter members. She joined DAR with Revolutionary War Patriot John Barrows, who served in Massachusetts as a captain. Many of the charter members were descended from Revolutionary War Patriot Barnabas Jackson, who was born in Plymouth, Massachusetts but moved to Maine after the war. Six of his DAR descendants joined Tisbury Manor in 1952.

Trustee Report, Fall Leadership Meeting, 21 Sep 2019

Secretary Davis Wright presented the following items from the Executive Committee for informational purposes only:

- Paul Callanan was presented the Gold Samuel Adams Medal for his contributions to the 2019 Congress in Costa Mesa, California.
- The Audit Committee has merged its various component parts into one body. The new Chairman is James H. Maples (AL).
- The updates to the Color Guard Committee Handbook has been approved.
- Dave Perkins (CT) was added to the Strategic Planning Committee

The Medals and Awards Committee reported the following actions:

- The Patriot Records Committee recommended numerous changes to the criteria for qualifying to receive the Patriot Grave Marking Medal. Among the many concerns raised was the issue of "double counting" by members of the Color Guard who might claim toward the PGM Medal and a Color Guard medal for the same single duty. The committee voted to send this proposal back to the Patriot Records Committee for further clarification.
- The Pennsylvania Society received approval for its proposal for the *Tiadaghton Elm and Fair Play Men Medal*. The medal is available to all members of the SAR without restriction. Medal sets are \$40 from the Pennsylvania Society.
- The Texas Society received approval for a **125**th **Anniversary Medal**. It is available only to Texas Society members.
- The Committee approved the *Benjamin Franklin Medal* as a fund-raising effort to benefit the SAR Library. The medal is open to SAR members and non-members and will be received for donating \$300. Medal ribbon bars will be awarded for additional donations: The Endowment Bar for \$500, the Life Bar for \$1000, and the Benefactor Bar for \$2000. Donations are cumulative toward achieving higher medal levels.
- The committee approved a proposal by the Veterans Committee to amend the criteria to receive the **Westmoreland Medal**. Multiple categories of service were added toward qualifying for this award presented to the SAR member who has the most outstanding record of service as a Veterans Administration Volunteer.

The Executive Committee presented the following action items for discussion and approval of the Board of Trustees:

- The Trustees were asked to approve an amendment to the Solid Light contract. The contract is currently in phase 2, step 2 towards creation and construction of the SAR Education Center and Museum. The primary modification is to add a retail store space to the contract and well as additional modifications. None of these changes will result in any additional cost. The amendment was approved.
- The Ex. Comm. recommended the US Stamp Operating Fund be closed and the unused funds (approximately \$2400) moved to the 250th Anniversary Fund. The US Stamp Committee has been inactive for several years. The motion was approved.
- The Ex. Comm. recommended approval of \$10,000 from the King's College Fund to be used for updated software and the purchase of two iPads. The request was approved.
- The Ex. Comm. requested the Trustees approve the expenditure of \$38,500 from the Alexander Hamilton Fund in 2019 and \$32,500 from the same fund in 2020 for the reworking of computer code for the membership data module. It is anticipated that the new membership data base to be fully online and available by Spring 2020. The expenditure was approved.
- The proposed 2020 Operating Budget was approved.
- The Ex. Comm. recommended the Trustees approve a request from the George Washington Endowment Fund Committee. The committee would like all future contributions to be equally distributed between the GWEF, the Horne Endowment, and the Meek Endowment. This will improve funding to the latter two programs. The request was approved.
- The minutes from the 7 July 2019 Trustees Meeting were approved.
- The Museum Board recommended that five swords in the SAR collection be deaccessioned and sold at auction. All the swords were purported to be contemporary with the Revolutionary War period. However, after professional examination, all were deemed to date to a later period. This is part of the Boards efforts to eliminate all non-period items from the collection. The request was approved.

The following informational items were presented:

The following historic sites were approved for National status:
a) The Battle of Eutaw Springs, b) The Battle of Princeton, c) The Battle of Redbank.

- The JROTC Enhanced Program winner award has been increased from \$4000 to \$5000.
- A task force has been established to evaluate the viability of adding electronic billing to the National website. It is anticipated this system could be used for the collection of dues on a national, state, and chapter level.
- The American Founding Documents project is on track and is entering phase 2.
- The National Society has insurance, but it is limited to the National Society. Since it does not cover States or Chapters the National Society us ultimately places and increased risk. An effort is being made to obtain more universal coverage.
- The Boy Scout training module is available online at their website and should be completed by any member that has contact with children.

- 2. Vice President, delete last line: "He is responsible for managing the Pacific District Conference when WASHINGTON SAR hosts the event."

Reason: This is under the control of the VPG.

4. Treasurer, #a, delete second line: "The endowment funds will be deposited as directed by the Endowment Fund Director."

Reason: Recommending we remove the position of Endowment Fund Director.

Add #d. "The Treasurer is responsible for filing any form(s) required by the State of Washington. *Reason:* This needs to be in writing.

Add #e and #f by moving #b & #c of the 9. Endowment Fund Director's section.

Reason: Recommending we remove the position of Endowment Fund Director.

Part 9. Endowment Fund Director:

Delete #a and move #b & #c to Treasurer and replace the words "Endowment Fund Director" with "Treasurer". *Reason:* Recommending we remove the position of Endowment Fund Director.

Add to #c: "A Financial Advisor, who may be a non-SAR member, may assist the Treasurer when determining the investment, if requested.

Reason: Other expertise may be required when making investment decisions.

Part 6, Committees:

1. Budget Committee, #2 remove from line 3: "and Endowment Fund Director".

Reason: Recommending we remove the position of Endowment Fund Director.

- 4. Delete complete section as this should be covered in the Pacific District "Rules" and controlled by the VPG.
- 8. National Congress Planning Committee. Delete #b and the complete section either now or in 2021.

Reason: We are recommending eliminating the position of Endowment Fund Director.

9.2 Rewrite to read: "The Treasurer will ensure compliance with the Society's Investment Guidelines and ensure the disbursement of the funds only as directed by the Board of Director.

Reason: The Treasurer becomes responsible for the management of the investments.

A recommended change to the Administrative Procedures for the control of Society Property was tabled to allow for revision.

The Treasure moved to change the Bylaws and Administrative Procedures to help align the Chapters with Society requirements. The motion was withdrawn to allow the directors to learn more about the changes.

The Treasure's recommendation to include the Vice President as signatory on the Society Accounts was approved. Secretary Al Pinkham and Gregory Lucas were assigned as Board members of the Nominating Committee Chapter President were tasked to provide members from each Chapter.



From The Archives By Allan Wenzel, WA SAR State Historian

BITS AND PIECES

- The Sons of the American Revolution was instituted on July 4, 1876, organized on April 30, 1889, and incorporated by Act of Congress on June 9, 1906. Compatriot Theodore Roosevelt, President of the United States, signed the Charter.
- Our SAR Magazine was officially named the "SAR Magazine" in May 1930. Prior to that, from at least 1911 and into the 1920's it was called "The Bulletin", and from at least 1925 until 1929 it was "The Minuteman".
- In response to a request for information by our State Society in **1927**, according to the Seattle Public Library, there were 90,000 living Civil War Veterans with 212,642 widows, 6 living Veterans with 970 widows of the Mexican War, and 17 widows of veterans of the War of 1812.
- Due to WWII, no annual Congress was held in 1945.
- At the February 24, 1928 Washington's Birthday banquet in Seattle, the guest speaker was Herbert Augustine Washington, a descendant of George Washington's brother. He brought and passed around a locket containing a hair from the head of George Washington, along with official photographic documents attesting conclusively to its authenticity.
- Early in 1920 there was a movement to divide the Washington State Society into two state societies, one on each side of the Cascades. The idea was voted down.
- The Seattle Chapter presented the plaque, which graces the George Washington Statue on the University of Washington campus. University of Washington President, Edmond F. Meany on July 3, 1925, officially accepted the plaque.
- In April 1957 the Washington Society was comprised of 7 chapters of 400 members.
- Three SAR President Generals have died in office. ...None were assassinated....

The Native American Moment

By Stan Wills, Vice Commander, Washington State SAR Color Guard Native Americans at Bunker Hill

Native Americans fought alongside of the Colonist at the Battle of Bunker Hill. The Battle saw the gallant participation of at least 15 Indian soldiers, including members of the Mashpee Wampanoag, Hassanamisco, Nipmuc, Tunxis, Mohegan, and Pequot tribes. Among those were

Joseph Paugenit (Mashpee), Ebenezer Ephraim (Hassanamisco), John Wampee (Tunxis), and Jonathan Occum & Samuel Ashbow (Mohegan). Rebecca Tanner (Mohegan) had two sons killed at Bunker Hill and eventually lost all 5 sons fighting in the Rev War. The Indians were responsible for guarding the East rail fence. When they ran out of

Powder they fought with tomahawks and knives until they were killed by overwhelming British soldiers. They were buried in a mass grave at Bunker Hill (Breed's Hill) and small plaque was placed there to honor their sacrifice.

Despite such losses, most Indians believed their contribution to an American Victory would improve their situation. But despite their sacrifice and commitment, the Indians were no better off than they had been before the war. Despite risks taken and lives lost during the Rev War, the native Americans continued to be relegated to second-class citizens. They could not vote, and tribal lands continued to be taken away from their



control. The phrase "all men are created equal" applied only to white patriots, not to "Patriots of Color".





Publication Schedule: Publish four times a year (after each BOD meeting).




