
Washington State SAR President's Message - Summer 2020 (3rd Quarter)

Chapter Meetings

Traditionally, after most of our chapters have enjoyed a summer hiatus, they begin meeting again in the fall. While last spring a number of chapters did not meet in the face of the epidemic, a few did continue meeting, using Zoom and other online meeting tools. Now that it

The Color Guard marches in parades, visits classrooms, provides honor guards at memorial services, and participates in other events.

A good example of the kind of selfless service our Color Guard provides happened recently in Port Angeles. In July, I received a letter from Patsy Everette, the widow of US Navy Commander Oliver G. Everette (Ret.), who died of Alzheimer's Disease in May in California. Everette was a career Navy man and a very active member of his SAR chapter in California. Mrs. Everette asked me if the Washington SAR could provide an honor guard at her husband's burial at Ocean View Cemetery in Port Angeles on September 3rd. I forwarded Mrs. Everette's request to Washington Color Guard Commander Neil Vernon, who sent it to Color Guard Captain Fred Gilbert of the John Paul Jones Chapter. Fred represented the Washington SAR and his chapter in paying tribute to Commander Everette at his interment, an act of kindness that can never be repaid. Mrs. Everette was very thankful to Fred and the Color Guard for being there for her and her husband.

It appears that a COVID-19 vaccine may be available in the coming months, which should go a long way to helping resolve the current epidemic. Until then, please stay safe, continue wearing a mask whenever you're around anyone not in your personal circle, and avoid crowds. Update: 2021 National Congress Planning Committee, Update - 2019

Mission: The SAR National Congress will be held in July in Renton, WA. As the host society, we need to provide two things for the Congress: our time and our money. We can contribute our time by volunteering to help at the Congress itself. We need 52 volunteers during the Congress. If you live outside the Seattle area, we will try to arrange home stay to make it easier for you to volunteer. We can also donate money to underwrite the Saturday night reception and dinner, which our society is hosting at the Museum of Flight.

Special 2021 Note from our President: The Louisiana Society has created a special medal honoring one of their Spanish Revolutionary Hero's. It is called the Galvez Medal set. Regular and Miniature are being offered for total of \$40 including postage. You can order them directly from their Society website at <u>www.lassar.org</u>. I have asked the Louisiana Society to help support our National Congress in Washington and thought it only fair to promote their Galvez Medals since we have quite a few members in our District with Spanish heritage. I recommend you review their website to see if there are any ideas you may want to consider.

Update: 2021 National Congress Planning Committee, Update - 24 Oct 2019

The Planning Committee for the 2021 SAR National Congress continues to meet monthly. Progress has been positive and steady. We are well on track in terms of venues, logistics, and materials. However, we will need your aggressive and total support to put us over the top.

From the outset, it was known the implementation of a National Congress by a relatively small state society would be a bold endeavor. Guests will be able to tour the museum during the day followed in the evening by a seated dinner beneath the SR-71 Blackbird jet. Dress shirts and tote bags have been purchased and embroidered with the Congress logo. Planning is well underway to provide a cruise to Alaska on Holland America for attendees who wish to extend their visit. Two tours to Tillicum Village, a Mariners baseball game, Pike Place Market, Chihuly Glass Museum, and the Space Needle are among the activity offerings for our guests.

The Committee is considering utilizing computers and bar coding to streamline the registration and tour process. We request anyone with knowledge in this area contact the Committee. Your services will be well rewarded. (Hint: chocolate.)

Please know that many people are working very hard behind the scenes. Countless decisions have already been made. Numerous details have been discussed. The dream is happening and this Congress will be pride of the Washington Society. Please join us on this journey and get involved in this rare opportunity. You are the SAR and the world is coming to visit.

Update: 2021 National Congress Planning Committee, Update – 20 Nov 2019

The 2021 National Congress Planning Committee met again on 20 November 2019. Planning is generally going well and many items have been completed. Fundraising remains a high priority and we are beginning to receive some additional contributions. They sell out quickly, so do not put off your decision to buy them when you can. Several medal sets are still available for purchase. More green polo shirts have been ordered and may be available for purchase at the Annual meeting.

The Committee is seeking an incredible voice to sing the National Anthem at a Mariners ball game. We are working on having the Honor Guard post the colors at Congress, with the Color Guard lining the first and third baselines. Our President General will throw out the opening pitch. In any event, we need someone with a strong and beautiful voice to fill that massive stadium. We also are in need of a truly impressive Congress website. If you have talent in this regard, please contact the Committee.

At the age of 99, *Dean Ladd* just made another sacrifice for his country.

It doesn't compare to the Japanese bullet that almost took his life at Tarawa, or the shrapnel wounds he suffered a few months later at Saipan. Or to the sacrifice of the men who fell at his side.

"Those poor kids, some of them were just 17 or 18 years old," Ladd said, shaking his head.

Still, it had to hurt for a man who has spent the last four decades touring battle sites and writing books about the war.

Ladd got the bad news last weekend: Six days before he was to fly to Pearl Harbor for ceremonies marking the 75th anniversary of the end of World War II, his trip was canceled by a rise in coronavirus cases in Hawaii.

The ceremony itself will go on, aboard the same USS Missouri where the war officially ended on Sept. 2, 1945.

But it will go on without Ladd and several other veterans.

"He's actually taking it pretty well," said his daughter, Lia, as they stood outside their home. Nestled in the foothills south of Mt. Spokane, it looks out onto a field of wheat – amber waves of grain behind an American flag.

Three months from turning 100, Ladd stood as straight as a flagpole during an interview and recalled a life that's the embodiment of the Greatest Generation.

Raised in northeast Spokane, he attended Bemiss Elementary and Rogers High School before enrolling in the fall of 1939 at Washington State College in Pullman.

Barely out of high school, Ladd also enlisted in the Marine Corps Reserve. One year into college, he was called to active duty. A year later – just a month after the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor – he was shipped to American Samoa to prevent the island from falling into Japanese hands.

Two months into the epic battle of Guadalcanal, Ladd and the 2nd Marine Division went into the line and stayed there for three months until the island was secure.

He wasn't as lucky at Tarawa. Wading toward the beach on Nov. 20, 1943, Ladd felt a searing pain in his gut.

"I didn't think I'd ever make it back to dry land," Ladd recalled.

But help came immediately, almost providentially.

He was rescued by a landing craft commanded by actor Eddie Albert, who took them back to a hospital ship.

The bigger miracle came aboard a troop transport, where Ladd's wound was treated by an abdominal specialist from the Mayo Clinic.

Recalling that moment, Ladd found it easier to deal with the missed opportunity this week in Hawaii.

"You always have life's problems and pressures, and I would always compare it to what I went through, almost dying," Ladd said.

"God's will, I guess," he said.

Ladd needed several months to recuperate, but was back in action as a first lieutenant during the bloody battle of Saipan in June 1944.


Seriously wounded by shrapnel from American artillery, he was sent back into action to help mop up after the largest Japanese banzai attack of the war.

Now with two Purple Hearts, Ladd saw more action as a company commander on the neighboring island of Tinian, where a year later the Enola Gay took off on its way to deliver the atomic bomb dropped on Hiroshima.

By then, Ladd was back in the states, at Marine headquarters in Quantico, Virginia. That's where he was when the war ended, training troops.

"I don't recall celebrating that much," Ladd said. "But I guess things got crazy in New York."

Ladd considered staying in the Marines. Instead, he got the best of both worlds. He joined the reserves, where he remained for 30 years and retired as a lieutenant colonel.





He also helped win the peace.

"I really wanted to get my engineering degree," said Ladd, who went back to Pullman and went on to senior positions with Kaiser Aluminum, North American Rockwell and Lockheed.

And he married Vera Michel, a Rogers classmate. They raised three daughters and traveled the world until her death in 2007.

Many of those journeys took Ladd to former battle sites, even those he didn't see in wartime.

Last year, Ladd and other Pacific War veterans were given an all-expenses-paid trip by the Best Defense Foundation, a nonprofit organization dedicated to helping veterans and their families.

Ladd appreciated the generosity, even more so the attitude of local kids in Saipan.

"They knew the history when it happened. Different than our young people here now, they don't know anything about it," Ladd said.

But Ladd isn't giving up. In the basement of his home is the "war room," which holds hundreds of books and manuscripts, many written by Ladd.

He's most proud of his book "Faithful Warriors," published in 2009 by the U.S. Naval Institute Press.

"I just don't want people to forget," he said.

Minutes from the BOD Meeting, 30 Jul 2020

President Craig Lawson opened the meeting at 7:00PM. A quorum of 20 BOD members and two guests were present using ZOOM. Chaplain Edwin Dierdorff offered the invocation.

President Craig Lawson welcomed everyone. He was happy to see a large number in attendance as we have been isolated for many months by the COVID-19 virus meeting restrictions. He encouraged the Chapters to conduct similar meetings and instructed Secretary AI Pinkham to research the cost of Zoom licensing.

Compatriot Greg Lucas reports there is a shortfall in the funding of the 2021 National Congress of \$7500. However, the expenditures are greatly reduced as firm plans cannot be made until the COVID-19 virus isolation is resolved.

The Treasurer recommended that all Chapters review their By-laws to ensure they are in alignment with National and Society By-laws. He strongly recommends that Chapters review their 501(c)(3) requirements and review their procedure to support and IRS audit.

Secretary Al Pinkham and Treasurer Tom Clark will conduct a training and planning meeting in August with all Chapter Secretaries and Treasures to support the dues collection and reconciliation process.

Reports were discussed. President Craig Lawson noted that the reports were informative and professionally written. He thanked all for their continued efforts in support of the Society.

Secretary Al Pinkham briefed the members on changes in the National data base. He will continue to monitor the changes. National is operating on reduced hours during the COVID-19 virus isolation.

The members discussed the use of Zoom for regular meetings. The consensus is to meet using Zoom including inductions. The physical certificate may be presented later.

The Board congratulated Compatriot Jim Lindley on his candidacy for National Historian. President Craig Lawson will send a letter of recommendation to National leadership.

From The Archives

THE SAR WAR SERVICE MEDAL

The SAR War Service Medal has an interesting history. According to the National Society the War Service Medal is listed as being established in 1899, for presentation to Compatriots who had served in the Spanish-American War of 1898. But, I find this to be nothing more than an assumption. It doesn't fit the known chronological history.

The pictured (photo 1) 1898 medal (reverse) is purported, but not confirmed, to be an example of the said SAR War Service Medal. I have reservations as to it being made in 1899. I believe it was manufactured in 1934. I have found no mention of it in the National SAR Magazine - The Minute Man, the forerunner to today's SAR Magazine.

The Spanish-American War was a very short war, less than 4 months, with a small number of participants, so few that it would not warrant the creation of a medal. Especially since the SAR had a small membership

in 1898, having very few young members capable of serving in a war. But the full conflict did not end until July 4, 1902, having many thousands more involved. Only then would there be enough SAR members eligible for a medal. But this medal only has "1898" on it.

Admiral Dewey, a Compatriot of the SAR, did not receive a SAR War Service Medal for his service in the 1898 conflict. Thus, the pictured example had to be manufactured after his death, which occurred in 1917, or he most assuredly would have been presented one.

The first known established recognition for war service, were bars created in the early 1920's to be placed on a Compatriot's SAR Membership Medal ribbon (photo 2). Bars representing the Civil War, Spanish-American War, and World War were made for Compatriots. The actually known War Service Medals were manufactured for the First World War and World War II. The Great War medal, has the dates "1917" & "1919" on the obverse (photo 3) and "World War" on the reverse, and was probably manufactured in 1934. That's the year the bars for placement on a Compatriot's Membership Medal ribbon stopped being advertised. A second medal was introduced after and for World War II, having that inscription on the obverse (photo 4), and manufactured around 1948. The big question is why would the pictured 1898 medal, if it truly was for war service, not be similar to those for World War I and II?

How do I know that the War Service Medal did not come into being until the 1930's? Because; there isn't a

medal for the Civil War, only a bar from the 1920's. That means that by the time the SAR started producing a War Service Medal there were no Civil War veterans alive as members in the SAR, or not in enough numbers to warrant the making of a medal. Thus the pictured 1898 medal had to have been manufactured around 1934, or it was some type of commemorative medal for Compatriots to buy.

One needed clarification; the Bronze Good Citizenship Medal of 1895 is the first award created by the SAR. It was first produced as a cased table medallion, the draping being added in 1932, making it a medal at that time.

By the advent of the Korean War a generic variety of the War Service Medal was created to cover all the subsequent wars and campaigns the United States may engage in, once again having bars, to recognize the conflicts from and including World War II onwards.

The medal photos are from the Historian's personal collection of Orders, Decorations and Campaign Medals. The WASSAR Historian Archives also has a couple examples amongst its artifacts.




HAPPY BIRTHDAY UNITED STATES



9 September 1776: On this day, the <u>Continental Congress</u> formally declares the name of the new nation to be the "**United States**" of America. This replaced the term "**United Colonies**," which had been in general use.

In the Congressional declaration dated September 9, 1776, the delegates wrote, "That in all continental commissions, and other instruments, where, heretofore, the words 'United Colonies' have been used, the stile be altered for the future to the "United States."

A resolution by Richard Henry Lee, which had been presented to Congress on June 7 and approved on July 2, 1776, issued the resolve, "That these United Colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent States...." As a result, John Adams thought July 2 would be celebrated as "the most memorable epoch in the history of America." Instead, the day has been largely forgotten in favor of July 4, when Jefferson's edited <u>Declaration of Independence</u> was adopted. That document also states, "That these United Colonies are, and of Right ought to be FREE AND INDEPENDENT STATES." However, Lee began with the line, while Jefferson saved it for the middle of his closing paragraph.

The Native American Moment

The Mohegan Indians were skilled sailors. They traveled the Great Lakes in canoes in all kinds of weather. When the Rev War started several Mohegans were used to assist in building ships and serve on all kinds of ships for the Continental Navy. One of those ships was the "Confederacy". The "Confederacy" was commissioned on 8 Nov 1778 and carried 36 cannons. She provided escort duty for Continental merchant ships. She was eventually captured by the British on 14 April 1781. Most of the crew were sent to the infamous "Jersey" prison ship. The British broke up the ship in 1782. Other ships the Mohegans served on were the "Putnam", "Shark" and "Oliver Cromwell"




Worth Repeating - Security Risk!!!
