

**Colonel Robert W. (Bob) Wagers, age 92** (US Army, Ret.), passed away on Saturday, October 16, 2021 in Mooresville, North Carolina. A longtime resident of Gig Harbor, he was Born May 25, 1929 in Salem, Oregon, Colonel Wagers was a veteran of 32 years active service-service that saw him go from Private E-1 to Colonel 06 and serve in such diverse places as Panama, Iran, Germany, Vietnam and Canada. # Washington State SAR Vice President's Message - Fall 2021 (4th Quarter)

I sometimes hear from fellow Compatriots that what happens at National has little impact on our State and Chapter Societies. I used to agree. But if that was ever true, as Bob Dylan so aptly crooned, "*The times they are a-changin*". Indeed, not only does National affect us; we affect National.

There is little doubt that the 2021 Congress changed us in a big way. Once an SAR backwater, the Washington Society became a dominant player on the National scene. Our Congress is now history, but the experience set an extraordinarily high bar for future host societies. As they struggle to surmount it, they will improve future Congress experiences for all who attend. Congresses will evolve in part because we excelled.

But National affects us in so many other ways. Consider the SAR Library. We think of it as a Louisville institution that few of our members will ever enjoy; its benefits limited to those who live near or make the trek to Kentucky. But due to the efforts of countless enduring souls, including one of own – Minuteman and Kentucky Colonel Jim Lindley – the library has scanned more than 10,000 volumes that are available to you here and now as searchable resources. And that list is growing.

Consider, also, the SAR Museum and Education Center that have been under development for years. NSSAR understands that we cannot hope to impact American thought in any significant way unless and until we become a national resource, available to everyone at the touch of a keystroke. As Big Data revolutionizes the dissemination of information and knowledge, the days of stagnant museum displays are waning. For that reason, the Museum and Education Center project is being designed, not only as a brick-and-mortar showplace, but as an electronic interactive experience that animates the study of the American Revolution, our patriot ancestors and our founding documents. Upon completion, you may enjoy it from the comfort of your favorite internet connection. A recent \$1,000,000 donation, with the hope of more to come, is accelerating the projected completion date. And for those concerned that the costs associated with developing the SAR Museum and Education Center will be reflected in dues increases to members, be assured that NSSAR is committed to the proposition of developing the project based on directed donations and new gifts.

The election of President General Davis Wright in July also changed the way we view the future. Past PGs had pet projects that could be completed within their one-year term. PG Wright chose, instead, to focus on the Mission and Purposes of SAR, which by their very nature cannot be accomplished in a single term. His vision of adopting a meaningful rolling five-year strategic plan – anchored on the Mission and Purposes of our Society - will transform SAR at every level. By setting realistic, achievable, stretch goals, with implementation plans, timelines and targets for how they are achieved, and modifying the strategic plan as facts, circumstances, money, growth, and new resources allow, State Societies and Chapters will become real-life actors in accomplishing the job laid out for us by Congress at 36 U.S. Code Chapter 1533. In retrospect, the SAR annual budget only makes sense in the context of our Mission and its implementing strategic plan.

How else are we experiencing our relationship with National? PG Wright streamlined the committee structure by creating organizational groupings of related committees. Certain previously free-standing committees became sub-committees of other so-called "supercommittees" for reporting and oversight purposes. For example, the Patriotic Outreach and Operation Ancestor Search committees became sub-committees under the overall supervision of the Veterans Committee Chair. Similarly, the Officer Training Committee, the Compatriot Training Committee and the Patriot Chest Committee each became sub-committees under the auspices of the Education Committee. The super-committees have enhanced clout, enabling them to become more competitive in seeking funds that advance the Mission by achieving their respective committee objectives. How will that affect you? In the next twelve months, you will begin to see output from national committees that: (a) are consistent with and coordinated with the strategic plan; (b) advance the Mission of SAR; and (c) make our work at State and Chapter levels relevant to the overall Mission and Purposes of SAR. For example, the Officer Training Committee will develop a series of training videos accessible to you locally when you log into the SAR website. Associated print materials will be available to you to be downloaded at your convenience. You will have the ability to learn first-hand how the structure and operation of SAR comport with federal, state and local laws and regulations. You will see, in a dynamic way, how the Mission and Purposes of SAR affect your fiduciary duties as officers and trustees of the organization. Rather than being dissociated from National, you will find that you are the gears that make the machinery of SAR work.

But I barely scratched the surface. The relationship between National and our respective State Societies and Chapters is becoming increasingly dynamic. Committees, such as the Council of State Presidents, are beginning to appreciate their role in the bi-directional flow of information.

This is an exciting time in our history. As we enter the 250th anniversary celebration of what our forefathers created for us, we have the ability not only to look to our past, but forward to our future. The times they are a-changing... Stay healthy. We need you.

# WASHINGTON SOCIETY NATIONAL SERVICE

During his acceptance speech at the National Congress in Renton, newly elected President General Davis Wright announced a significant reorganization of the National Committee structure. Essentially, many of the Committees with similar focus were grouped together as sub-committees of a unifying Committee. For example, the Records Digitization, Patriot Records, and GRS Sub-committees are now grouped into the Information Technology Committee.

One of the many goals of this reorganization was to reduce the number of individual meetings at Leadership and Congress. Under this new model the Sub-committees will meet via Zoom throughout the year. Then, the Committees will meet in person at the Leadership Conferences and Congress with the Sub-committee members in attendance if possible. **This new structure presents a unique opportunity for members of the Washington Society.** Since many of the Sub-

committees will be meeting via Zoom, it is now possible to become a member of a National Sub-committee. Active participation and contribution is a requirement of committee membership. In the past this was only possible by traveling to in-person conferences. For some, this requirement was not possible or practical. Now that barrier has been removed and several Washington men have joined National Sub-committees and will be actively participating electronically. I invite you to review the new Committee and Sub-committee listing and consider your potential involvement in these

Russ Oliver, WASSAR State Flag Chairman, Assistant WA SAR State Secretary, George Washington Chapter Secretary. C. Marshall Eberhart, George Washington Chapter Historian and Membership Retention. Perry Taylor, VP John Paul Jones Chapter, Member NSSAR Veterans Recognitions Sub-Committee and Chairman Mike Hutchins, VP George Washington Chapter, and Color Guard Captain.

The Committee was reorganized as of April 2021. We have analyzed 2020 dropped members and reported the findings to WA SAR Board of Directors, reviewed the extensive collection of e-earning tools developed by preceding committee members. Mostly authored by Compatriot Doug Nelson. These tools are easy to use templates for a variety of presentations supporting strong chapter development. # 2021 SAR Fall Leadership Conference, 23-26 September 2021

This year's Washington State contingent consisted of Jim Lindley, Keith Weissinger, Tony Abbott, Greg Lucas, Rob Sexton, and President General Davis Wright has made the America 250th first-time attendees Perry Taylor, and Mike Hutchins.   - 10. Names are posted on the National website of people who are giving Patriot Chest presentations. National would like to add the names of all compatriot in each state to this list

### 3) Education Center and Museum

- i. SAR Museum Collection There are a variety of lesson plans and virtual presentations of the museum collection
- ii. The design of the museum is almost complete. The final design is expected Dec 21. The goal is to have the Museum open for the 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Revolution
- iii. \$1.3 million on hand, another \$533.000 in pledges towards the construction of the SAR Education Center and Museum

### 4) Library & Archives Committee

- i. The SAR Genealogical Research Library was named a TripAdvisor 2020 Travelers' Choice Winner! The SAR Library is ranked in the top 10% of attractions worldwide based on reviews.
- ii. Library staff members are adding full text electronic book links to its online catalog. This means you will see a growing number of books in our Library becoming available to you from your home computers! <u>www.sar.org/sar-library-catalog</u>. Over 10,000 books are available from the library in digital format. 50% of the SAR Institutional History has been digitized
- iii. Council of State Presidents has a program to recognize states where all officers have completed the Youth Protection Program Training

### 5) Color Guard Committee

- i. Color Guard members from 25 state societies attended the National Congress
- ii. Washington's birthday is now a National Color Guard event
- iii. The virtual events policy that was put in place as a result of COVID ended at the National Congress. There was reported an increase in participation during this period, especially from West Coast Color Guard members.

### iv. Working on two new medals.

- 1. The first is for youth participation for non-members under the age of 21 who provide service to the color guard. It will have the same requirements as the award of the Bronze Color Guard Medal
- 2. The second is a lifetime service medal for 20 years of service. There was some discussion about whether the award of the Von Steuben Medal will be a pre-requisite.

- i. Awarded 2025 Congress to Connecticut
- ii. Awarded 2026 Congress to North Carolina
- iii. Tours for the 2022 Georgia Congress will include Ft Morris, Midway Church, and the 8<sup>th</sup> Air Force Museum
- iv. America 250 has a new website: <u>SAR 250th Committee News.pdf (connecticutsar.org)</u> A toolkit is in the works to help state and chapter societies establish programs in support of this program.
- v. Voted to support the Homecoming 250 initiative in Philadelphia. This is the 250<sup>th</sup> birthday of the Navy and Marines at their birthplace of Philadelphia. It has an impressive list of supporters including 14 living

Secretaries of the Navy. They did want any monetary contributions from us. All they asked for was an endorsement.

- vi. Changed the criteria for the Stark and Westmoreland Awards
- vii. The Poster/brochure contest was moved from the Americanism Committee to Youth Programs

i. Is working on a branding guide for chapters. A media kit is also in development

# Minutes from the BOD Meeting, 21 Oct 2021 (Ellensburg, WA)

The October 2021 meeting of the Sons of the American Revolution Washington SAR Society Board of Directors was convened at 11:14AM, Saturday, October 30th, 2021 in-person at the Buzz Inn Steakhouse, 2202 Canyon Road, Ellensburg, WA 98926. A quorum was present with a total of ten voting Members, and four additional non-voting attendees also in attendance.

- WA SAR President Dr. Keith Weissinger called the meeting to order.
- WA SAR Chaplain Edwin Dierdorff gave the Invocation.
- WA SAR Vice President Greg Lucas led all those present in the Pledge of Allegiance.
- WA SAR Assistant Secretary Russ Oliver led the Compatriots in the Pledge to the SAR.
- A moment of silence was observed in honor of a recently deceased WA SAR Compatriot.

### **Opening Remarks**

WA SAR President Dr. Keith Weissinger welcomed all in attendance and noted one modification to the printed agenda (removal of the Old Business item for "Accept Minutes of 8-16-2021").

### Old Business:

### Approval of 31 July 2021 WA SAR Society State BOD meeting minutes

A motion was made to accept the minutes of the 31 July 2021 as written, which was seconded, and was approved by unanimous consent.

### Officer and Chapter President Reports:

- State President: WA SAR President Dr. Keith Weissinger had nothing additional to add and encouraged all Officers and Committee Chairmen to point out only the highlights or issues needing discussion from their pre-read reports.
- State Vice President: WA SAR Vice President Greg Lucas drew attention to exhibit A in his report, the strategic plan of 2016, as a starting point for a dynamic go-forward strategic plan. Arthur Dolan, President of George Rogers Chapter, noted one update for the last page.
- State Secretary: WA SAR Assistant Secretary Russ Oliver, attending for State Secretary Al Pinkham, had nothing additional to add.
- State Treasurer: WA SAR Treasurer Robert Sexton asked the BOD how to distribute the remaining surplus balance from the National Congress account. After a short discussion that determined that all National Congress bills had been paid, a motion was made to move the remaining National Congress surplus funds to the WA SAR State general account and close the National Congress fund. The motion was seconded and was approved by unanimous consent.
- State Registrar: WA SAR Registrar John Kraft was not present this meeting.
- State Chaplain: WA SAR Chaplain Edwin Dierdorff had nothing additional to add. In response to a question from WA SAR Vice President Greg Lucas, Edwin confirmed that all the families of deceased Compatriots from this year had been contacted, and the passing of all the Compatriots reported to NSSAR.

- State Historian: WA SAR Historian Allen Wenzel was not present this meeting. National SAR Historian Jim Lindley was in attendance and had nothing additional to add.
- State Color Guard Commander: WA SAR Color Guard Commander Neil Vernon encouraged all those present to include their Color Guard members in events and presentations. Neil also encouraged Color Guard member attendance at the upcoming April 2022 WA SAR Annual Meeting.
- National Trustee: State National Trustee Viren Lemmer drew attention to several NSSAR medal proposals currently in discussions: a proposed medal for presentations to youth, plus a proposed lifetime achievement award for presentations to youth; a proposed color guard lifetime achievement (20+ years) medal; and a proposed color guard medal for non-SAR, non-CAR youths.
- Alt. National Trustee: State Alternate National Trustee Robert Sexton had nothing additional to add.
- At Large Director#1: State At Large Director Doug Nelson was not present at this meeting. WA SAR President Dr. Keith Weissinger shared with those in attendance that Doug was pulling back from his SAR responsibilities to focus on his family responsibilities, and that WA SAR Vice President Greg Lucas will be taking over the Council of Chapter Presidents.

### Break for Lunch

### Officer and Chapter President Reports, Continued:

- Alexander Hamilton Chapter: Chapter President Jerry Bordelon reported that a \$2500 donation from his chapter to the 2021 National Congress fund was not needed and was returned to his chapter. Jerry reported that \$1000 will go to 2022 WA SAR meeting support, and the balance to acquire rifle raffle tickets for his chapter members.
- Cascade Centennial Chapter: Chapter President Mark Shaffer was not present this meeting. WA SAR Vice President Greg Lucas pointed out the Veteran's Day event in Bellevue, WA, sponsored by the Cascade Centennial chapter would be a state-level event, second only to the Auburn Parade in scope and attendance. Technology limitations will prevent online participation. WA SAR Treasurer Robert Sexton also noted that the Cascade Centennial chapter held their first hybrid chapter meeting, with technology allowing for online participation as well as in-person participation.
- Fort Vancouver Chapter: Chapter President Jeff Lightburn commented that his chapter started hybrid chapter meetings in September 2021 with modest technology investments (iPhone at the podium), noting that audio, video, and funding for the technology are all challenges. Jeff also noted his chapter honored their first female Eagle Scout.
- George Rogers Clark Chapter: Chapter President Art Dolan commented launching a new chapter during COVID was a challenge, and that they are still settling on a physical location for chapter meetings. Despite this, his chapter enjoys a strong initial culture, with a chapter member signing ceremony as a special highlight that other chapters noted as a best-practice to emulate.
- George Washington Chapter: Chapter President Dr. Dale Harshman was not present this meeting. Chapter Secretary Russ Oliver had nothing additional to add.
- John Paul Jones Chapter: Chapter President David Irons was not present this meeting. Compatriot Perry Taylor had nothing additional to add.
- Mid-Columbia Chapter: Chapter President Jerry Schultz commented his chapter has also experimented with hybrid meetings and need to continue improving the audio technology. Growing to 41 members, his chapter received press coverage for their veteran's standdowns held in Yakima and Kennewick, with three of his chapter officers attending in color guard uniform.
- Ranger Chapter: Chapter President Bill Barnsdale was not present this meeting. WA SAR President Dr. Keith Weissinger noted that Ranger Chapter also launched during COVID and has had challenges. They have not held meetings during COVID and may need support and nurturing from all chapters as they restart their chapter meetings.
- Seattle Chapter: Chapter President Grant Rauzi was not present this meeting. WA SAR Color Guard Commander Neil Vernon noted the chapter has a growing membership, with the first in-person chapter meeting coming soon at a new location with AV support.
- Spokane #1 Chapter: Chapter President Carl Durkoop was not present this meeting.

### Unfinished Business:

• 2022 WA SAR Annual Conference update: Compatriot Dick Paul commented that the 2022 conference will be held 8-9 April 2022 at the Heathman Lodge in Vancouver, WA. Theme will be "Leading and Learning for Future Success", and the meeting will be held in concert with the Pacific District meeting and the Oregon State Society Annual meeting. Hotel rooms can be reserved now, 888-475-3100, ask for the SAR rate. Expect registration to start early January 2022. Attendance goal is 15% of the State Society membership, which will be tracked by chapter via a thermometer chart. There will be re-enactors, tours, area events, a strong agenda, and a noted guest speaker to help draw attendance.

Dick encouraged all to promote in-person attendance at your upcoming individual chapter meetings and events, augmented with a strong advertising campaign via the chapter Secretaries.

WA SAR Challenge Coin update: WA SAR President Dr. Keith Weissinger showed the 1<sup>st</sup> draft of the coin art to all those present and asked for input. Many comments and suggested improvements were discussed by those present (art changes, color changes, art size changes, art placement adjustments). Keith noted those and will pursue a 2<sup>nd</sup> draft of the coin art. Goal is to have them in-hand by the time of the 2022 WA SAR Annual Conference, with the State Society to pay for the first batch of 100 and sell them to the chapters at-cost. Production is expected to take 3-4 weeks once the design is finalized, with MSRP price of \$20, and all profits going to the chapters.

### New Business:

- Appoint 2023 WA SAR Annual Conference Chairman: WA SAR President Dr. Keith Weissinger stated that Compatriot
  Dick Paul was doing a stellar job planning the 2022 WA SAR Annual Conference and made a motion that he also be
  appointed to lead the planning for the 2023 WA SAR Annual Conference. The motion was seconded and passed by
  unanimous consent.
- Discussion of 2023 WA SAR WA SAR Annual Conference location: WA SAR Bylaws determine the 2023 location must be in eastern Washington, and Keith is proposing Spokane (with Spokane #1 Chapter initial support of the idea). The formal vote for the 2023 location will be postponed until the next BOD meeting in January, to gain Spokane chapter representation for the vote.
- Appoint Member and activate Nominating Committee to Select VPG: WA SAR President Dr. Keith Weissinger noted that a candidate will be needed by the time of the 2022 WA SAR Annual Conference. Two BOD members are needed, with the Nominating Committee also made up of one member of each chapter. Keith asked WA SAR Vice President Greg Lucas to lead the Committee, who accepted. After a call for volunteers for the second BOD member, Keith asked George Rogers Clark Chapter President Art Dolan to join Greg on the Committee, who accepted. Keith then asked each chapter President to work with Greg and Art to achieve one member from each chapter, either the chapter President or another appointed chapter member.
- Proposal to increase award amounts for youth programs: WA SAR President Dr. Keith Weissinger lead a discussion on increasing the monetary amount awarded for youth award winners. Most of the discussion dealt with the difficulties of the state mandating award amounts for chapter finalists, given each chapter having unique budgets. Keith made a motion that this discussion should be brought to the Council of Chapter Presidents for further exploration, with a goal to standardize chapter award amounts and increase state award amounts. The motion was seconded and passed with unanimous consent. State Treasurer Rob Sexton made a motion to support this effort by spending endowment funds, which was seconded and passed with unanimous consent.
- Appoint Strategic Planning Committee (new state committee): WA SAR President Dr. Keith Weissinger proposed a new standing committee, to prepare and maintain a rolling 5-year plan. WA SAR Vice President Greg Lucas noted that we have a plan from 2016 that needs light refreshing and ongoing attention. After discussion, Keith made a motion to create a new standing Strategic Planning Committee, which was seconded and passed with unanimous consent. Keith appointed Greg Lucas as Chair, with Rob Sexton, and himself to be initial committee members, with Greg to nominate additional members. Greg suggested Neil Vernon for Color Guard representation, and Neil agreed. Neil mentioned that Mike Hutchins and Kelly Schultz as potential members. Keith made a motion to start the committee with these 6 initial members (Greg as Chair, Rob, Keith, Neil, Mike, and Kelly), which was seconded and passed by unanimous consent. Next steps: Greg will draft a mission statement and description of the committee, and research Bylaws and Admin Procedures for guidance. For the January BOD meeting, vote on the mission statement.
- Appoint State Education Coordinator: this will be a new state appointed position, WA SAR President Dr. Keith Weissinger appointed Viren Lemmer, who accepted. Viren noted that he is new to the NSSAR Education Committee, but that NSSAR wants each state to have this position for new member training, mentoring programs, new youth medals, and officer training. After discussion, Viren made a motion that this new position work closely with the existing state Membership & Chapter Support committee and will have a state-level governance role (not overstepping the local chapters) and could contact each new state member to offer support and mentorship, which was seconded, and passed by unanimous consent.
- Propose Youth Protection Training streamer award: Compatriot Perry Taylor proposed a new WA SAR society streamer award for chapters, to encourage and recognize each chapter for completing SAR Youth Protection training. A sample streamer was displayed, white with gold text "Youth Protection Training". While current training completion tracking is at NSSAR, local chapter training completion tracking will be researched. Goal is to award the first set of these streamers at the 2022 WA SAR Annual Conference. Perry will continue to refine his proposal, for a future vote.

- NSSAR George Washington Fund: WA SAR President Dr. Keith Weissinger shared that this NSSAR fund can help cover 50% of under-funded SAR projects, if you have the other 50% already arranged. Can't fund awards, but other SAR projects (patriot grave marking). Also, inquire with WA SAR state contacts, the state might help fund your project too!
- WA SAR existing Ethics rules: WA SAR President Dr. Keith Weissinger noted that NSSAR is increasingly asking state societies to have formal Ethics rules, policies, and processes. Keith appointed Compatriot Russ Oliver (who agreed) to research the current state Bylaws and Administrative Procedures and compile all current references to ethics, compare to NSSAR, and to send the results to WA SAR Vice President Greg Lucas, with the goal to eventually publish consistent state rules and processes.
- New Youth Award Proposal: WA SAR President Dr. Keith Weissinger is talking with NSSAR about a new proposal for a Youth Visual Arts contest, 5–10-minute videos with a Revolutionary War focus. Info only at this stage. First step would likely be a pilot program in 5 state societies. WA SAR is not committed yet, but if excitement exists, Keith would love for WA SAR to join in the pilot.
- 250<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration: WA SAR President Dr. Keith Weissinger noted that this is the current focus for NSSAR and should be the focus of the state and chapters too. NSSAR has a list of 3000+ anniversaries to celebrate, leading up to the 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary itself. 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary banners are available, \$35, and it is recommended to fly them at these events.
- Presentation of Liberty Medals: WA SAR President Dr. Keith Weissinger received several Liberty Medals at the 2021 National Congress for members of our state, and didn't want them to sit awaiting the 2022 WA SAR Annual Conference, so he is distributing them now:
  - Compatriot Jean Tinney Liberty Medal Certificate, and Oak Leaf (subsequent award)
  - Compatriot Viren Lemmer Liberty Medal Certificate, and Oak Leaf (subsequent award)
  - Compatriot Mike Moore Liberty Medal Certificate, and Oak Leaf (subsequent award)
  - Compatriot Neil Vernon, Liberty Medal Certificate, and 2xOak Leaf (subsequent awards)
  - Compatriot Rob Sexton, Liberty Medal Certificate, and Oak Leaf (subsequent award)
  - Compatriot George Vernon, Liberty Medal and Certificate (first award) (Neil's Dad)
  - Compatriot John Kraft, Liberty Medal and Certificate (first award)
- Question on state History Teacher Award: George Rogers Clark Chapter President Art Dolan asked if home schoolteachers meet the criteria and can be eligible? Greg Lucas said yes, but that the award criteria of letters of recommendation from other teachers might be tough to acquire.
- Distribution of 2020 Chapter Flag Award Program participation awards: State Flag Award Chairman Russ Oliver distributed to chapter representatives their 2020 participation certificate awards, and Old Glory streamer pins. Ranger Chapter awarded their very first US Flag display in 2020, and earned their Old Glory streamer.

# From The Archives:

### MAXWELL FRANKLIN LESLIE: Navy War Hero

Maxwell (Max) Franklin Leslie was born on October 24, 1902, at Seattle, Washington, the son of William Franklin Leslie and Inez Leone Maxwell.

After high school Max attended the University of Washington before being accepted to the United States Naval Academy, at Annapolis, Maryland in 1922. Graduating in the Class of 1926 Maxwell was commissioned an Ensign in the United States Navy. In 1929 he began flight training at the Pensacola Naval Air Station in Florida, and was designated a Naval Aviator in 1930. He was married to Elizabeth Harris Black.

At the time of the United States' enterance into World War II, Max was executive officer of Bomber Squadran 3, stationed aboard the U.S.S. Aircraft Carrier *Saratoga*.

Luckily, he had departed Pearl Harbor several days before the Japanese attack on the battleships at anchor in the harbor on a mission to deliver fighter planes to Wake and Midway Islands.

He and his squadron were part of Task Force 17 assigned to the U.S.S. Aircraft Carrier *Enterprise*, while on convoy escort duty to protect the U.S.S. Aircraft Carrier *Hornet*, engaged in a top-secret mission to launch Doolittle's Raiders which were enroute to bomb Tokyo, Japan.

Lieutenant Commander Leslie served with distinction during the Battle of Midway (June 4, 1942). He was stationed on board the U.S.S. Aircraft Carrier *Yorktown* where he commanded Bomber Squadron 3, flying Dauntless Dive Bombers. While following the Japanese Destroyer <u>Arashi</u>, which had been counterattacking the U.S.S. Submarine <u>Nautilus</u>, Leslie and Lieutenant Commander <u>Wade McClusky</u>, from the U.S.S. *Enterprise*, arrived high above the Japanese task force at the precise moment its <u>combat air patrol</u> were below them engaged in repelling U.S.S. *Yorktown*'s torpedo bombers. This was the critical time, when the Japanese First Air Fleet was most vulnerable. With Zeros forced to fly too low to be effective, Leslie's and McClusky's squadrons dove from above through a clear sky and unloaded their bombs on the Japanese carriers, their decks cluttered with fuel lines and munitions Admiral Nagumo had ordered for the refueling and rearming of his aircraft. Max and his squadron attacked the Carrier *Soryu*, McClusky's squadron attacked the Carrier *Kaga*, and Lieutenant Dick Best with his squadron attacked the Carrier *Akagi*.

In just five minutes, *Enterprise's* Scouting Squadron 6 and Bombing Squadron 6 destroyed two Japanese fleet carriers. The <u>Kaga</u> was abandoned and sank. The <u>Akagi</u> was abandoned just after Kaga went down, and was <u>scuttled</u> before dawn on June 5th. Attacking nearly simultaneously with McClusky's squadron, *Yorktown*'s Bombing Squadron 3, led by Max, inflicted heavy damage on the Japanese Carrier <u>Soryū</u>, and she also sank that evening. After successfully attacking the <u>Soryū</u> Leslie and his wingman Lieutenant J.G. P. A. Holmberg ran out of fuel and ditched their planes next to the Heavy Cruiser *U.S.S. Astoria*, due to their Carrier the *Yorktown* being under heavy attack preventing a return landing. Leslie, Holmberg, and their gunners were rescued by one of the cruiser's whaleboats. A single carrier, <u>Hiryū</u>, which was ten miles to the north of the other three carriers, escaped damage the morning of June 4th, but she was sunk on June 5th. For his heroism during the Battle of Midway, during which he is credited with playing a major part in winning the battle and consequently the war in the Pacific, Max was awarded the United States Navy's second highest decoration for valor, the <u>Navy Cross</u>.

Max continued to serve overseas during World War II, and after the war spent the rest of his career on various ships and at shore stations. He retired in 1956 with the rank of Rear Admiral. In addition to the Navy Cross, he was awarded the Bronze Star decoration with "V" (Valor), and the Presidential Unit Citation issued to the crew of the

U.S.S. *Enterprise*. He also received: the American Defense Service Medal with Fleet Clasp, the American Theatre Campaign Medal, Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal, World War II Victory Medal, and the National Defense Service Medal.

Maxwell was admitted to the Washington State Society, Sons of the American Revolution, Spokane Chapter #1, through his Patriot ancestor (Great-Great-Grandfather) Benjamin Dolbier, on November 13, 1923. His two sons and his Father also held membership in WASSAR.

Compatriot Maxwell Franklin Leslie died on September 26, 1985 at San Diego, California. A biography states he was buried

in the Fort Rosecrans National Cemetery, at San Diego, California. A search of all National Cemetery records does not show a listing for him. I believe he was buried at sea.


### **Western Region**


