

I recently had the honor to attend the CAR State Annual Conference and bring greetings on behalf of the Washington Society SAR. It gave me the opportunity to meet members and Officers of the CAR and share with them the wonderful youth programs and projects in our Society.

At the time of this writing, we are actively putting the finishing touches on our own State Annual Conference to be held in **Vancouver, Washington on 8-9 April 2022**. The entire first evening will be focused on the youth. Winners of our own youth contests will be recognized, several will read their essays, and teachers will receive well-deserved recognition. I know it will be a special evening and a proud moment for the Washington Society.

I encourage you to read the article I wrote for the CAR newsletter outlining our current youth programs. A copy should be included with this newsletter. You will note the Board of Directors recently reaffirmed out commitment to youth education by dramatically increasing and expanding the prize money awarded. You will also note some areas that could be improved. We currently do not have a chairman to oversee the Middle School Brochure Contest or the Elementary School Poster Contest. This position would require a minimum amount of time and training is available from our other fine Chairmen. Please consider offering your time and guidance to our youngest group of students who need to learn about our history and heritage.

Likewise, the Society needs a Chairman for the SAR Youth Video Contest currently under development. Several of your Compatriots have been working behind the scenes on this project, particularly in the George Rogers Clark Chapter. Still, we still need a chairman to oversee and coordinate the effort. A knowledge of video production is not required. The contestants will provide that expertise. We need a Compatriot to provide a point of contact, initiate advertising, and offer encouragement. The seed has already been planted.

Regarding the CAR, an issue was brought to my attention. The majority of the CAR Senior Leaders are ladies from the DAR. The SAR currently provides only two representatives. I offer no disrespect to our fine DAR Sisters, but the CAR needs and deserves strong male role models. Compatriots, I ask you to consider and recognize the benefits of your involvement with young people who have already made a commitment to history, education, and patriotism.

Finally, it is time to restart our school presentations. Mask mandates are ending and the students are back at their desks. Let's unfurl the flags, dust off the Patriot Chests, and don the uniforms so the kids can experience history live and in person. Viren Lemmer, our new Chairman of Education, will be helping to coordinate school presentations. The Youth Education Medal has been approved and is available to recognize your commitment to educating young Americans about their past and the sacrifices made to establish this unique homeland.

Join with us as we continue and redouble our Focus on the Youth. The need is real and the rewards will be immeasurable.

NSSAR Education Domain Overview By Brooks Lyles (NC), Chairman, Education Committee

Let's start in the beginning, where all good stories should start. The SAR is descended from several lineal organizations primarily The Sons of Revolutionary Sires, San Francisco, CA and The New Jersey Sons of the Revolution, and was founded 30 April 1889, the 100th Anniversary of the inauguration of President George Washington. It was a fraternal and civic society composed of the lineal descendants of the men who fought for our independence in the Revolutionary War. On 9 June 1906, during the administration of Compatriot and President Theodore Roosevelt, we received a Congressional Charter that declared *The Objects of this Society to be to be*



patriotic, historical, and educational; to unite and promote fellowship among the descendants of those who sacrificed to achieve the independence of the American people, to inspire them and the community-at-large with a more profound reverence for the principles of the government founded by our forefathers; to foster true patriotism; to maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom. It is from this that the Education mission of the SAR is derived.

In the intervening century the SAR worked very hard to execute these missions and met with varying levels of success. They used to work with state boards of education to develop curriculum, developed many of our current youth programs/contests, worked with the National Park Service on historic sites and celebrations, and conducted education outreach in their local schools, but with varying levels of success. When the organization received exemption from Federal income taxes under the provisions of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code 501 we were forced to tread a fine line of political neutrality to maintain our tax-exempt status. This has caused most chapters and state societies to shy away from interaction with their local governments in the education arena lest they be affiliated with a party or a position. And yes, it is harder to get into schools these days that it was, but it is not impossible.


Fast forward to this century and the 117th National Congress where a Resolution was passed regarding the SAR's commitment to expanding the Headquarters and Library complex to include a museum and naming it the Center for Advancing America's Heritage to emphasize our educational mission. "Therefore, this 117th Annual Congress of the Sons of the American Revolution requests that the President General now cause our National Society's governing documents to be examined and appropriate changes proposed so the *education function* would be identified in them, and, after due process, any proposed amendments would be submitted to future Annual Congresses for approval or disapproval." An additional result of this resolution was the hiring of a full time Education Director, Ms. Colleen Wilson, who has been critical in the growth of our Education Programs.

In 2017, during the term of past President General Mike Tomme I was appointed the Chairman of the Education Committee and was directed to develop a multi-tiered Education Outreach Program that included Youth Protection Training for Compatriots, The President General's Education Outreach Streamer Program to recognize chapters that were executing the SAR's Education mission, and the development of a central data base of Compatriot Presenters and Presentations. Also, that year Compatriot Wayne Snodgrass of Colorado established the Patriot Chest Reimbursement Program with a \$10,000 fund to reimburse State Societies up to 50% of the startup cost for two new Patriot Chests per state. That program was integrated under the oversight of the Education Committee and managed by our full time Education Director. Compatriot Snodgrass also developed the Patriot Chest 100 list of Patriot Chest presenters organized by state which available on the Education Domain website. In 2019 Compatriot Greg Ohanesian of South Carolina donated \$50,000 towards the establishment of the Ohanesian Family History Award to recognize with a \$500 cash award, chapters in four different size categories, for doing the most in-school uniformed history presentations.

Last year we were directed by President General Davis Wright to reorganize the Education Committee into a "Super Committee", incorporating several current standing committees (Education Outreach, Officer Training) as subcommittees, and developing others to bring "Training" into the Education Domain. For reporting and organizational purposes, The SAR's Annual Conference on the American Revolution was also assigned. This year we have debuted an Education Domain Website that is accessible to all members on SAR.org but is also available to nonmembers and educational professionals; proposed and received approval of a Youth Education Medal; developed a National Youth Protection Policy; developed the Compatriot Training Committee; and received a designated Education Funding line in the annual budget. That is a lot to digest, even for people who have been in the SAR for a long time.

To familiarize you with the current National Education Committee and to make sure all state leaders are current with our national initiatives, I have been asked to provide an overview of our national education programs and identify your rolls, responsibilities, and our expectations of the states.

This is how the National Education Committee is organized, as of 2021 Congress. The higher-level committee is responsible for interaction with National Leadership and oversees administration, policy, and budget while providing top cover for, and guidance to the subordinate committees. The Committee meets in person at Spring and Fall Leadership and via Zoom as the need arises. The subordinate committees are developing their own specific programs in support of the Society's education and training missions with a focus on developing five-year plans and funding projections to reach their goals in time for the opening of the SAR Education Center and Museum in Louisville and the 250th Anniversary of our American Independence in 2026. The various committees meet individually via Zoom whenever required. Chairs and Vice Chairs meet with the parent committee at Fall and Spring Leadership Meetings. To get where we want to be in Education, we need compatriots and congress meetings. Technologies like Zoom allow us to do that, and they expand our outreach opportunities as well.

Current National Education Initiatives and Programs:

1. The President General's Education Outreach Streamer Award - was established in 2017 and are awarded to Chapter's (based on size) that make a certain number of historical presentations annually. 'Presentations' included old presentations done in new venues and new presentations done in old venues. It encourages the presentations be done in period clothing but does not mandate it. Reports are due to National by 15 March and cover one year, 1 Jan to 31 Dec annually. Starting in 2022 the reporting information will be derived from the Americanism Report. The PG's Education Outreach Streamers have been presented at the Monday Evening Awards session at every Congress since, and the number of chapters and societies participating has grown each year to include this last one.

The Streamer will be awarded to Chapters, based on size, that do a certain number of presentations:

- a. Membership a/o 1 Jan of 1-40 Compatriots must do 3 Presentations
- b. Membership a/o 1 Jan of 41-80 Compatriots must do 5 Presentations
- c. Membership a/o 1 Jan of 81-120 Compatriots must do 7 Presentations
- d. Membership a/o 1 Jan of 121+ Compatriots must do 9 Presentations
- 2. The Patriot Chest Reimbursement Program and Patriot Chest 100 (https://www.sar.org/patriot-chest-100/) – Includes information on the Patriot Chest Reimbursement Program, Patriot Chest Vendors, and the Patriot Chest 100, who are the active Compatriots who have Patriot Chests/Travelling Trunks and do presentations within their areas of operation. Also, there you will find Compatriot Presenters and their "Presenter Data Sheets" which are in effect, their resumes showing a picture, training, YPT Status and the available presentations they can do. There is a template for developing your own Presenter data sheets and examples of appropriate ones to emulate.

3. Youth Protection Policy and Training -

- a. **Youth Protection Policy** "The SAR strives to create and maintain a safe environment for all youth who participate in SAR sponsored activities. To the best of their ability, Compatriots and staff, their spouses and partners, and other event volunteers must safeguard the children and young people with whom they come into contact and protect them from physical, sexual, and psychological abuse."
- **b. Youth Protection Training** Completion of the NSSAR Online Youth Protection Training (https://www.sar.org/courses/youth-protection-training/) within 3 months of assumption, appointment, or election to a leadership position at the National, Society or Chapter level, assignment as a National Committee Chair or Vice Chair, or assignment to a designated youth serving committee.

NSSAR online YPT must be retaken, and records updated every three years. All Compatriots should have an annual review presentation of the guidelines and potential signs of abuse and neglect, along with reporting procedures NLT than the annual congress. It is anticipated that the three years may be reduced to two years. The Compatriot is expected to maintain a copy of their individual completion certificate. Chapter and Society Education Directors should maintain a current roster of their members who have completed YPT and their expiration dates.

4. The SAR Youth Education Recognition Program

- . **The Sar Youth Education Medal** The NSSAR Youth Education Medal was established in 2021 to recognize sustained education of our youth by members of the Sons of the American Revolution.
- To receive the Youth Education Medal, the following criteria must be met:
 - 1) The Youth Education Medal will be awarded to a Compatriot after 15 educational presentations have been made. The look-back period for qualifying presentations will extend to 1 January 2021.
 - 2) The presentations must be given to preschool or school age children.
 - 3) The presentations may be given in both public and private schools. The presentations may be given in or out of the classroom.
 - 4) Presentations made in different classes during the same day, in the same school, may be counted as separate presentations if specific data such as teacher or separate class periods is provided.
 - 5) Presentations given as part of a 'school day' for living history events are acceptable.
 - 6) The presentations may also be given to youth groups or organizations such as, but not limited to the following: Children of the American Revolution, American Heritage Girls, Trail Life, Scouts, Girl Scouts, 4H, home school COOPS, church youth groups, etc.
 - 7) The presentations must be recorded in the Chapter and Societies' Americanism Report to be used towards the tracking and award of the PG's Education Outreach Streamer. Presenters should develop and submit Presenter Data Sheets to the National Education Committee and must have completed Youth Protection Training.
 - 8) The Medal may be awarded multiple times.
 - a) After the initial Medal has been received, the recipient will receive a bronze oak leaf cluster for each additional 15 presentations given.
 - b) Five Bronze Oak Leaf Clusters can be replaced with one silver oak leaf cluster. Presentation and wear of oak leaf clusters shall follow NSSAR policy.
 - c) The presentation(s) must be approved by the Society Education Program Chairman or equivalent committee within the society.
- b. **The SAR Youth Education Medal with Lifetime Achievement Bar -** State Societies can award The NSSAR Youth Education Medal with 'Lifetime Achievement' Bar to two individuals annually.
 - An SAR Compatriot must have distinguished themselves in bringing the history of the American Revolution and the accomplishments of our patriot ancestors to young people by being involved in education outreach activities or by presenting Education Outreach Programs to our youth for a period of more than 10 years.
 - 2) State Societies will purchase the Youth Education Medal and the Lifetime Achievement Bar and mount the bar on the drape prior to presentations within their states. Recipients will be reported on the Society's Americanism Report.
 - 3) Special Awards of The NSSAR Youth Education Medal with Lifetime Achievement Bar to non - SAR persons can be proposed by State Societies to the Education Committee via email request. Requests will detail their rationale for the presentation and must include 1) who the proposed recipient is; 2) what they did to earn it; and 3) why they deserve our recognition.
 - 4) The Education Committee will vote on a case by case basis whether to approve the awards for non-SAR persons based on the merits of the nomination and maintain a file of the recipients.
 - 5) These non-SAR member awards will count against the State Society's annual allotment of 2 presentations of the Medal for Lifetime Achievement

- c. The SAR Youth Education Lapel Pin Awarded by the Education Committee to any person who makes a donation of \$250 or more towards the SAR Youth Education Account. Donors will be recognized with a Certificate and Lapel Pin. Pins and Certificates will be paid for out of committee funds.
- d. The Ohanesian Family History Presentation Award This is an existing program, approved by the Medals and Awards Committee prior to last year. It is designed to annually award Chapters, based on 4 different size categories, that have done the most oral presentations on any aspect of the American Revolution collectively, by its compatriots in schools during the last year. Presentations must be done in colonial clothing or uniform. The program is endowed by Compatriot Greg Ohanesian (SC) and his family. The individual chapter award is \$500 each, for a total of \$2000 in prize money annually. There is no minimum number of presentations required.

- 5. The Education Domain Website (Click on the Education Tab at sar.org)
 - a. Lesson Plans
 - 1) Causes of the American Revolution is online educational curriculum consisting of 11 Lesson Plans designed by Shae Luch, a University of Michigan Graduate student for the SAR. They are keyed to items in the collection of the William Clements Library at the University of Michigan, an Education partner of the SAR.
 - 2) 250th Anniversary Timeline
 - b. Keyholes to History Is part of an educational audio series about the American Revolution. Each segment is paired with lesson units and targeted to students, teachers, and the public. Approximately 60 seconds in length, each Keyhole to History is focused on providing background information to encourage further inquiry.
 - c. Artifacts Pictures and information about the artifacts we have assessed for the SAR Education Center and Museum
 - d. Speaking Out About History A series of interviews with best-selling authors of Revolutionary War focused books. The interviews are recorded one hour YouTube videos featuring an overview of the book by the author and a series of questions submitted by you, SAR Compatriots. To date we have interviewed David O. Stewart on the George Washington: The Political Rise of America's Founding Father; Patrick K O'Donnell on The Indispensables: The Diverse Soldier-Mariners Who Shaped The Country, Formed the Navy and Rowed Washington Across the Delaware; Jack Kelly on Valcour: The 1776 Campaign that Saved the Cause of Liberty and Nathaniel Philbrick on Travels with George. Soon to be added will be Mary Beth Norton's Book 1774. The Long Year of Revolution and William Sterne Randal's book on the Founder's Fortunes.
 - e. Youth Awards The Current National Level Winners in each of our contests
 - f. Media
 - 1) Interpreter Videos
 - i. **Colonial Surveying**
 - Blacksmithing ii.
 - iii. American Flag Booklet

6. What is expected of the State Societies?

- a. The programs that national committees put together mean very little without the support of the state societies and chapters. Chapters are where the rubber meets the road and where the Compatriots executing the mission reside. The first thing we would like to see is two-way information sharing, both from National to the membership and from the chapters back to National. Some things like developing a NSSAR Youth Protection Policy and online Youth Protection Training must be done to protect both young people and the organization. Some like the Officer and Compatriot Training Programs (in the works under Compatriots Gregory Lucas (WA) and Jay DeLoach (NC)) are because of a perceived need in the organization. We need membership to tell us what you want to see in out Training Programs. We need to know how we can best support you in the accomplishment of the SAR's Education Mission. Is what we are asking achievable? Is everything we are doing making an impression on our membership or in our local communities? We can develop programs all day long, but unless compatriots know about them, unless there is interest in them, unless we are scratching an identified itch, and getting feedback from the field on their effectiveness it is all just wasted effort. We do not want to waste our efforts, nor your time.
- b. In an ideal world every state society in the SAR would appoint an Education Director and adopt the National Education Programs as a model, modifying them to meet their unique state and local requirements.

- c. State Education Directors would inform, track, and report the efforts and compliance of their chapters in the areas of YPT, education outreach and school presentations, Patriot Chest presentations and the activities of their resident Living History Interpreters and reenactors. All these are Education Outreach activities.
- d. State Education Directors would track individual Compatriot outreach efforts and make sure Youth Education Medals are presented. Likewise, they would recognize older Compatriots and non-SAR persons who have done exceptional service in the Education Field with the Youth Education Medal with Lifetime Achievement Bar.
- e. That State Education Directors would encourage Chapters to embrace the Societies' Education Mission as their own and share information about the NSSAR Education Domain website with their local schools, teachers, and youth group leaders so they could use the Curriculum, 250th Timeline, Keyholes to History, Artifacts, Speaker Series and Interpretive Videos in their schools or youth groups.
- f. States that have not already done so would take advantage of the Patriot Chest Reimbursement Program and invest in their own Patriot Chests to enhance their Education Outreach Programs.
- g. States and chapters would report these activities in their annual Americanism Reports so we can track and recognize those chapters who are doing the right things Nationally with The PG's Education Outreach Streamers and the \$500 Cash Awards provided for in the Ohanesian Family History Presentation Awards. Hopefully having these awards presented at a State Society BOM/BOG would inspire others to participate.
- 7. Education is a mission directed in our US Congressional Charter and we are building an Education Center and Museum at the National Headquarters in Louisville. SAR Congresses have passed resolutions focusing on our education efforts. Honoring the sacrifices of our Patriot Ancestors and keeping alive the memories of what they sacrificed in the founding of this nation is what we pledge to do every time we repeat the SAR Pledge. However, we need everyone on the oars and rowing together to get us across that river, full of all the obstacles and challenges of today, to accomplish that mission. I, my Committee Chairs and Vice Chairs, and the Education Committee as a whole stand ready to help you be successful in our common mission.

What do we mean by "Sons" of the American Revolution?

Lineage societies sometimes seem to speak their own language and the Sons of the American Revolution is no exception. Members are often referred to as compatriots.

So, what is a "Son?"

A Son is exactly what you'd expect. A Son is a member of the Sons of the American Revolution who was a biological descendent of a SAR qualifying ancestor. He is also referred to as a Compatriot. Our patriot ancestors may have been a soldier, militiamen, or frontier rifleman. Many were likely too old to fight but gave aid toward the cause. Others served the cause on committees supporting the cause while others paid taxes toward supporting George Washington's troops. As in other wars, the steady income of a Revolutionary War pension may have provided an incentive for a younger man to join the war effort. When the Sons of these relationships joined the SAR as adults, they were called "Sons or Compatriots" as opposed to those who were actually grandsons, great-grandsons, and great-great-grandsons.

SAR Youth Contests

The Sons of the American Revolution was started with a focus on **Patriotism**, **History**, and **Education**. Many of our programs were made to work toward these goals. Each program and contest encourage students to learn more about the American Revolution. Some of you may already know about our youth contests, but for those who don't, this is a short overview.

Several of the contests use the *written word*. The Knight Essay, Enhanced JROTC, and Eagle Scout Contest ask the students to research a topic related to the Revolution and write an essay about their findings. The Rumbaugh Oration contest is similar, but it uses the *spoken word*. Contestants will write, memorize, and then present their topic in a dramatic oration. For the younger students, the Middle School Brochure and the Elementary Poster Contests seek to combine colorful artwork with written captions to demonstrate an understanding of a Revolutionary War topic. Unfortunately, these two programs are currently inactive, but they could be reactivated if enough interest arises.

The Washington Society SAR has a long history of supporting these youth programs. I am pleased to announce we have taken some bold steps to increase our commitment. The Rumbaugh Oration Contest, long absent from our offerings has

now been reactivated. Our new Rumbaugh State Chairman is actively spreading the word about the contest and is currently accepting new contestants. In addition, the Washington Society has dramatically increased the prize money for all our contests. We now offer prize money for second and third place for many of our programs. Many of our first-place winner will now receive \$1000!

January 2022 WA SAR State Society BOD Meeting Minutes

The January 2022 meeting of the Sons of the American Revolution, Washington SAR Society Board of Directors, was convened at 9:03AM, Saturday, January 29th, 2022, online via the Zoom application. A quorum was present with a total of thirteen voting Members, and four additional non-voting attendees also in attendance.

Opening Ceremonies

WA SAR President Dr. Keith Weissinger called the meeting to order.

WA SAR Chaplain Edwin Dierdorff gave the Invocation.

WA SAR Historian and Color Guard Commander Neil Vernon led all those present in the Pledge of Allegiance.

WA SAR Treasurer and Alt. National Trustee Robert Sexton led the Compatriots in the Pledge to the SAR.

WA SAR Secretary Al Pinkham verified we had a quorum.

Opening Remarks

WA SAR President Dr. Keith Weissinger welcomed all in attendance, shared that we have a full agenda today, and noted he was a little under the weather today and asked for our patience and support.

Approval of October 2021 WA SAR Society State BOD meeting minutes

WA SAR President Dr. Keith Weissinger asked if there were any additions or corrections needed for the minutes of the October 2021 WA SAR Society State BOD meeting. Hearing none, a motion was made to accept the minutes of the 30 October 2021 WA SAR Society State BOD meeting minutes as written, which was seconded, and was approved by unanimous consent. Officer and Chapter President Reports:

State President: WA SAR President Dr. Keith Weissinger welcomed the new chapter presidents at our meeting and highlighted that he continues to receive compliments on the National Congress that our Society recently hosted – on time, under budget, and with a surplus no less! However, the membership drop rate in our Society was high this year at dues renewal and noted that Covid-19 impacts continue for the National Society and our State Society – the virus is still circulating, and good men are still dying. It is up to individual chapters and their good judgement whether and

when to hold in-person chapter meetings.

- State Vice President: WA SAR Vice President Greg Lucas was not present this meeting.
- State Secretary: WA SAR State Secretary Al Pinkham reported that reconciliation is now complete and state membership stands at 496 members. Al shared that he is increasingly challenged with mobility and physical health issues and has asked Assistant State Secretary Russ Oliver to take over the meetings, minutes, and administrative duties. Al will keep all membership duties for one more year. Subsequent discussion noted that deputy or assistant roles could be helpful for all State roles.
- State Treasurer: WA SAR Treasurer Robert Sexton noted that for the fiscal year ending December 31st, 2021, it was a strong year financially with a budget surplus and a net surplus from the National Congress budget as well. The Endowment fund was also up in 2021. See the December 31st, 2021, Treasurer's report for details. Rob reported he was putting the finishing touches on the 2022 operating budget.
- State Registrar: WA SAR Registrar John Kraft presented his Q4 2021 report and noted that we have no long-term pending applications for our Society. John shared that application timelines with National are still challenged, with roughly 3 months needed for new member application processing and roughly 9 months for processing supplemental ancestor applications.
- State Chaplain: WA SAR Chaplain Edwin Dierdorff noted that he is coordinating a few memorial certificates for compatriots who passed away.
- State Historian: WA SAR Historian Allen Wenzel resigned his membership in SAR, and the vacancy will be filled in the interim by Compatriot Neil Vernon.
- State Color Guard Commander: WA SAR Color Guard Commander Neil Vernon encouraged all those present to attend two upcoming Stark Award activities a WW2 veteran re-interment in early February 2022, and a Korean War veteran interment in April 2022.
- National Trustee: State National Trustee Viren Lemmer was not present at this meeting.
- Alt. National Trustee: State Alternate National Trustee Robert Sexton, in deference to a full agenda, had nothing additional to add this meeting.
- At Large Director#1: State At Large Director Doug Nelson was not present at this meeting.
- Alexander Hamilton Chapter: Chapter President Jerry Bordelon, in deference to a full agenda, had nothing additional to add this meeting.

- Cascade Centennial Chapter: Chapter President Mark Shaffer, in deference to a full agenda, had nothing additional to add this meeting.
- Fort Vancouver Chapter: Chapter President Allen Furlow, in deference to a full agenda, had nothing additional to add this meeting.
- George Rogers Clark Chapter: Chapter President Art Dolan was not present at this meeting.
- George Washington Chapter: Chapter President Mike Hutchins, in deference to a full agenda, had nothing additional to add this meeting.
- John Paul Jones Chapter: Chapter President Perry Taylor, in deference to a full agenda, had nothing additional to add this meeting.
- Mid-Columbia Chapter: Chapter President Richard Roddy was not present at this meeting.
- Ranger Chapter: Chapter President Bill Barnsdale was not present this meeting.
- Seattle Chapter: Chapter President Grant Rauzi was not present this meeting.
- Spokane #1 Chapter: Chapter President Carl Durkoop, in deference to a full agenda, had nothing additional to add this meeting.

Unfinished Business:

- 2022 WA SAR Annual Conference update: Chairman Dick Paul appealed to all chapter presidents to plug registrations for our upcoming State Annual Conference in April 2022 we are at 33% of our registration goal. State membership may be down, but the conference raffle is exceeding expectations. Dick also submitted an updated and revised budget for the annual conference, which continues to be a balanced budget. Dick made a motion to approve the revised budget, which was seconded by Compatriot Al Pinkham, and after discussion that clarified that there is a contingency included in the revised budget, the motion carried via unanimous consent. Dick then covered possible Covid contingency plans, in the case there is a spike in case counts or a new variant emerges, and the conference, that we would request all donations to the conference stay, we would hold the raffle, and we would refund all other costs to the members. The motion was seconded by Compatriot Perry Taylor, and after discussion the motion carried via unanimous consent. Our Society is responsible to cancel by March 1st, 2022, so a go-forward decision is planned for that date. Compatriot Jeff Lightburn appealed to all chapter presidents to provide 1-page summaries of their chapter and the chapter accomplishments, and to prepare a chapter table display for the conference.
- WA SAR Challenge Coin update: WA SAR President Dr. Keith Weissinger reported that the initial order of 300 coins have been distributed to the chapters (Mid-Columbia Chapter's shipment was stolen in transit but subsequently replaced by Keith). Keith started discussion if there is a desire to order more, in order that they arrive by the annual state conference. Compatriot Neil Vernon made a motion to order 150 more coins, Compatriot Rob Sexton seconded, and after discussion the motion carried via unanimous consent. Keith will verify with the vendor that 150 coins is a valid order amount, and if so, place the order or report back to the BOD on the order sizes supported by the vendor.
- WA SAR Strategic Planning Committee update: Chairman Greg Lucas was not present this meeting.
- WA SAR Education Coordinator update: Chairman Viren Lemmer was not present at this meeting.

New Business:

- Proposal for Eagle Scout Scholarship Awards Chairman Greg Emerson was not present this meeting.
- Proposal for increasing award amounts for all State Youth Program Awards WA SAR President Dr. Keith Weissinger reported that National is increasing the monetary awards for the Youth Program portfolio and asked the question if we should increase the youth program monetary awards at the State-level. It was noted that these youth program awards are funded by our state investment account, not the state operating budget. Compatriot Rob Sexton made a motion that state-level youth program monetary awards be increased, as stated in the WA SAR State BOD Youth Award Increase Amend Part 10 Jan 2022 proposal \$1000 for first place, \$500 for second place, and \$250 for 3rd place (see that report for specifics per contest). Compatriot Perry Taylor seconded the motion, and after discussion that clarified that the new amounts would apply to current contests in-progress, the motion carried via unanimous consent.
- Appoint new State Medals and Awards committee chairman WA SAR President Dr. Keith Weissinger reported that State Medals and Awards Committee Chairman Allen Wenzel resigned his membership in SAR. Keith recommended Compatriot Jim Lindley (not present at this meeting) be appointed and requested BOD approval of this appointment, pending Jim accepting. BOD approval of the appointment of Jim Lindley to this position carried via unanimous consent, subject to Jim agreeing.
- Proposal for authorization of WA SAR State Achievement Medal at the chapter-level WA SAR President Dr. Keith Weissinger pointed out an inconsistency in awarding authority currently for the WA SAR specific Superior Service Medal

(state and chapter-level awarding authority) and the Achievement Medal (state-level awarding authority only). Keith wants to encourage chapter-level awarding authority for rewarding deserving members. Compatriot Mark Shaffer made a motion that the awarding authority for the WA SAR Achievement Medal be changed to state and chapter-level awarding authority. Compatriot Perry Taylor seconded the motion. Discussion of the motion revealed that National Medals and Awards Committee approval will likely be needed for this proposal, so postponement of this motion was needed to allow for that coordination. Compatriot Perry Taylor made a motion to amend the motion for postponement, which was seconded by Compatriot Mike Hutchins, and the amended motion carried via unanimous consent.

- State Nomination Committee Report Chairman Greg Lucas was not present this meeting.
- Proposal to establish an America 250th State Committee WA SAR President Dr. Keith Weissinger reported that this is a NSSAR President-General focus and noted that it would be helpful to have a state committee focused on this area to track points for earned awards, and he asked for volunteers. With no volunteers in evidence, Keith asked all present to talk with chapter members about this opportunity and report back to him.
- State Knight Essay Committee update Chairman Jeff Lightburn reported that the winner from last year will read their essay at the upcoming Annual State Conference in April 2022, while in the current contest we have 8 submissions from Mid-Columbia chapter alone. Jeff is now on the National Knight Essay Committee as well, and he has a comprehensive toolkit for Knight Essay – see him for details.
- State Rumbaugh Oration Committee update Chairman Mark Shaffer reported we have no orations submitted yet and the deadline is coming up soon! Mark admitted he got started late and will start in August the next cycle.
- Proposal for State donation to State CAR Annual Conference WA SAR President Dr. Keith Weissinger started discussion if our Society would be interested in donating to the State CAR Annual Conference. Compatriot Doug Nelson reported that we have a strong history of making these donations, and Compatriot Rob Sexton reported that our past budgets revealed we gave \$250 in 2018, and \$200 in 2019, with no donations for the 2020 and 2021 budget years. Compatriot Rob Sexton made a motion that we donate \$200 to help support the State CAR Annual Conference. The motion was seconded by Compatriot Mark Schaffer, and in discussion Doug supported that we amend the motion to provide \$200 each year. The amended motion was made, seconded, and carried via unanimous consent.
- State Membership & Chapter Support Committee update Chairman Mike Hutchins reported his committee is
 preparing a state-wide dropped member report that will dig more deeply into why our members leave the Society.
 Mike also reported that his committee is taking the lead on curating a collection of eLearning's and Job Descriptions
 and is investigating a Members-Only page of the state website for storing these and making them available. State
 Webmaster Curtis Hanner has some technical challenges supporting this on the current technology platform, and Mike
 will work with Curtis and Compatriot Mark Shaffer on sizing the ask of the state website to determine if we need to do
 this in-house or need professional assistance.
- Proposal for electronic payments Compatriot Art Dolan was not present this meeting.
- State Investment Manager Report update Chairman Chuck Waid reported that the State Endowment is down 14% so far this year, but this is not a reason to panic and recommended no changes to the investment structure. All audits were performed successfully when Treasurer Rob Sexton took over as Treasurer.
- State Ethics Committee discussion WA SAR President Dr. Keith Weissinger reported that Chairman Greg Lucas is on the National committee, and the goal of the recent National discussions on this topic is to create a common state framework. Eventually, the outcome will likely be a state-level Ethics Committee.

2022 SAR Spring Leadership Conference, 3-5 Mar 2022

Vice President General's Report

The following report summarizes a variety of information gleaned from the Spring Leadership Conference.

The NSSAR currently employs Fifth/Third Bank for its investment services. The Investment Committee performed extensive research into other financial institutions to evaluation their procedures and fee schedules. Essentially fees may be assessed as a set percentage of the total amount invested or they may be part of the investment instrument itself (e.g. mutual funds, ETFs, etc.) The former is straightforward and readily available, but the latter may be more difficult to assess. After evaluating their research, the Investment Committee opines that Fifth/Third Bank offers the best combination of service, performance, and fees and that the NSSAR should continue its current relationship.

The Society has hired a new Library Director, Sherry Daniels.

The Genealogist General reports the time to complete New Applications is 13 weeks and Supplementals is 38 weeks. There has been a large turnover in the employed genealogists. A search is currently ongoing to hire new genealogists. The Executive Director and the Genealogist General will be implementing an "emergency action plan" to specifically address the issue of lengthy application approval times.

The Registrar General reports the current membership is 35,493. The Trustees approved a proposal to increase the amount of the Registrar General's Award to \$200 when funds are available with a minimum of \$100. At the time of the Conference, four State Societies had not submitted any documentation for their annual reconciliation. Several State Societies still have reconciliation in progress or are incomplete. The deadline for completion of annual reconciliation is 31 January. The President General stated that any State Society with incomplete reconciliation by 1 May will not be allowed to seat Delegates at the National Congress in Savannah.

The Membership Committee reports that the Yellow Database will be closed **1 April 2022**. A training video is available on the national website for understanding the Blue Database.

The National Society is working toward a national billing and payment system that will extend to the State Societies and Chapters. It is anticipated to be available after April 2022. They are currently waiting for the Blue Database to become fully active.

The Ethics Committee has written model procedures and guidelines for the State Societies. These will include sample statements that can be easily adapted by the States for their use. A part of the guidelines includes the recommendation for the formation of a State Ethics Committee. It is anticipated that the majority of ethics issues, particularly those confined to the State, will be handled by the State Societies without involving the National Ethics Committee.

The Trustees approved a transfer of funds from the SAR Foundation to the NSSAR Invested Funds Account (NSSAR IFA). These funds were previously held by the NSSAR, but were transferred to the SAR Foundation in the past for a number of reasons. The funds to be transferred are:

- Alexander Hamilton Fund
- Life Membership Fund
- Building and Outreach Education Fund
- All Special Purpose Funds, including all investment, savings, or checking accounts related to such funds:
 - Eagle Scout Fund
 - o Rumbaugh Historical Orations Contest
 - o Knight Essay Contest
 - o JROTC Contest
 - Education Fund
 - o CAR

- Poster Contest
- Brochure Contest

The SAR Foundation will continue to raise and hold funds associated with the SAR Education Center and Museum and such other accounts as authorized by the Foundation Board and will continue to assist in the raising of funds for all NSSAR programs. Funds raised by or through the SAR Foundation not associated with the SAR Education Center and Museum will be transferred to the associated NSSAR IFA account monthly.

The Medals and Awards Committee reports approval of the following:

- Youth Education Medal with Lifetime Achievement Bar:
 - \circ $\;$ State Societies can award only two per year $\;$
 - \circ The recipient must have presented Education Outreach Programs for more than 10 years
 - \circ $\;$ Non-SAR members can be nominated to receive the award

Note: The Youth Education Medal was previously approved. Specific information and criteria for this award will be available soon in the SAR Handbook.

- The Liberty Medal will now be presented in bronze, silver, or gold color. Sponsorship of 10 new members qualifies a Compatriot to receive the Liberty Medal. Moving forward, sponsors of 10-99 new members will receive the bronze; sponsors of 100-199 new members will receive the silver; sponsors of <200 new members will receive the gold. Individuals may purchase the appropriate color medal, or they will receive the appropriate color medal when the next award level is achieved. The wearing of oak leaf clusters will remain unchanged. Only one color Liberty Medal may be worn as they will all have the same precedence.
- The Washington Society Achievement Medal may now be authorized and approved by the individual Chapters.
- The Meritorious Service Medal will now be available in three colors: bronze, silver, and gold. This corresponds to the awarding level: Chapter, State and District, and National, respectively. When available from merchandise, Compatriots are encouraged to purchase and wear the appropriate color medal based on the awarding authority. In lieu of wearing two silver medals (State and Chapter), the silver medal should be worn with an oak leaf cluster.

The Trustees have approved a change to the DNA policy as relates to member applications. With the revision, DNA evidence may now be used to prove lineage from generation 1 to 2 **or** from generation 2 to 3. However, DNA evidence may not be used to prove both generational steps in the same application.

The National Society will be seeking to hire a Public Relations Director. This staff position will cover social media, public relations, and also serve as Press Officer. These services will become increasingly necessary as we move through the 250th Anniversary of the Revolution.

The Trustees have approved the 5-year Operational Plan for the 250th Anniversary. This plan has been distributed to the State Presidents who should in turn make it available to the Chapter Presidents. All Compatriots are encouraged to review this document and utilize its insight when planning for programs and events.



The Brief Summary States "Establishes the Semi guincentennial Committee to coordinate and provide guidance for Washington's official observance of the 250th anniversary of the founding of the United States".

The committee's duties as outlined in the Bill is in strong alignment of the objectives of the Sons of the American Revolution. As these progresses and becomes more publicized and engrained into the Education system, our services can become in great demand! Polish up your presentation scripts and hold on for the ride! Thank you for all you do in promoting the objectives of SAR. I look forward to seeing you at the State Conference.

LEGAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMORANDUM FROM: EDMON H. MCKINLEY, CHAIRMAN, GENERAL ADVICE GROUP DATE: 15 NOV 2021 SUBJECT: 501(C)(3) ISSUE

The NSSAR is a 501(c)(3) charitable organization. As such, the NSSAR, state societies, and chapters are governed by the rules that apply to those organizations.

Two areas that need to be of particular concern to the NSSAR at all levels relates to the 501(c)(3) charitable organizations absolute prohibition "from directly or indirectly participating in, or intervening in any political campaign on behalf (or opposition to) any candidate for elected political office." You are encouraged to review the very fine instructive comments relating to this entire issue in the Handbook, Volume III of the Official Handbook, Requirements for Maintaining Tax Exemption; Additional Restrictions on 501(c)(3) Organizations – Paragraphs 3-4-5.

Participation of Color Guard Units and political comments or speakers at meetings are areas where extra caution should be exercised. For illustration purposes only, the following scenarios are presented:

- 1. A Color Guard Unit should not participate in an event or activity that clearly or indirectly that is political in nature or sponsored by an identifiable political party or group. This includes groups that are known to have partisan political positions or are supported by individuals who take strong political positions. Note that this includes organizations or activities that may promote or express liberal or conservative values not just Republican or Democrat agendas.
- 2. An individual SAR member who participates in such a partisan political event should clearly do so as a private individual and ensure that their actions or statements are not attributed to the SAR. No SAR flag should be used and the members should not wear any SAR medals and the program or other publicity should not identify them as SAR members. Also, this applies to units of individuals.
- 3. At any meeting, extra care should be taken to ensure that speakers do not give political campaign speeches supporting themselves or another political candidate. This prohibition includes a political candidate or elected officials seeking reelection.



4. No political candidate or elected official should be endorsed by a SAR entity or member who does so as a SAR member.

It is understood that each activity or event must be considered on its own merits and circumstances to determine if it demonstrates support of a partisan political issues or point of view or political candidate.

It is strongly recommended if an SAR society, chapter or unit has a concern that they are being asked to participate in, support, or provide a venue that may violate or appear to violate political restrictions on a 501(c)(3), they seek advice from a person knowledgeable in this area. As a practical matter, it is also recommended that they become fully familiar with the organization or individual sponsoring an event or speaker at a meeting.


