## Washington State SAR Message from the President

#### **Compatriots:**

The post-Covid era introduced additional uncertainties into our lives, including ongoing health risks, burgeoning inflation, recession, economic instability and political polarization that rivals any in history. But such was also true in Colonial America in the years leading up to the Revolution. The more things change, the more they stay the same.

As we approach the 250<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Declaration of Independence, those events will take center stage in the national dialogue. I challenge you to contact your mayors, your legislators, your noteworthy leaders in every discipline to join us by signing our State's copy of the Declaration of Independence.

Our other work must also go on. For Washington to take its rightful place on the National stage, we must lead in every field. Our youth must be encouraged to enter and win state and national youth contests. The Patriot Trunks must be taken to every school district in the State. Our service to Veterans and to our communities must be reflected in our Americanism and Stark reports. Our Ladies Auxiliary must double and triple in size and impact, and we must accept the challenge of growing our membership in difficult times.

These are exciting years, with incredible things in store for our Society, all of which carry their own host of challenges. But accepting such challenges will bring out the best in our collective character.

#### From National

Compatriot Reaches Record Number of Applications: Compatriot Timothy Ward, Minuteman Class of 2014, of the Ohio SAR recently became the first ever Compatriot to be the first line sponsor of over 1,000 New Member applications. A tremendous achievement and outstanding contribution to the Society. Congratulations, Tim! 250<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Membership Directory: Beginning in the fall of 2023, SAR will start working on its America250 Collector's Edition Membership Directory. SAR has partnered with PCI, which bought out the former partner company on previous directories. This new partner has contractually agreed to address all the issues from the previous edition as reported by our membership. In addition to the standard information and features of earlier directory editions, this America250 publication will include the commemorative SAR/America 250 logo and a 16-page commentary section by a patriotic author or authors to be named later in production. The last volume of the membership directory was valuable enough for compatriots to sell 3300 volumes. Merchandise that conflicts with the SAR store will not be sold, members will be given clear and timely communication on what to expect, and all communication received by mail will have the official SAR logo attached to avoid confusion. No 'high-pressure' sales tactics will be used. A portion of the proceeds of every directory sold goes to support the SAR, and members are encouraged to participate and purchase if interested.

**Committee Directory:** The current Committee Directory is posted under the Members listings on SAR.org. It is dated 1 June 2023. President General Pickette has declared the Directory as closed and no additional committee memberships or changes will be accepted.

**SAR Education Center and Museum:** Work on the SAR Education Center and Museum is well underway. Preparation work recently began on the larger elevator that will be installed in the rear area of the Museum. The

contractor has made the initial cuts in the concrete and block to allow for drilling equipment to fit into the shaft. Earlier in late May, the "AIA" (Standard Agreement between an Owner and Architect) was signed between NSSAR and ARCHON, Inc. for Design Documents. These architect design documents are for the interior build-out of the first floor, mezzanine, and portions of the lower level of the Headquarters. They will be used to prepare the space for the museum design/builder's work. Regarding the Request for Proposals (RFP) for the Museum itself, a Pre-Qualification Solicitation List was prepared and used to send a request for submission of a letter of interest to NSSAR; the request was sent to 17 firms and the due date of submissions is June 23. A press release was also sent out for wider distribution.

**Issues with MailChimp Messages:** The first release of the "News from the SAR" was sent to all members on April 18. Many members reported they were unaware of the message and located it in their Spam folder. Several configuration settings have been changed in MailChimp to preclude this from happening in the future. The "News" releases may be found by clicking on News in the blue banner on SAR.org.

#### Mark Robert Shaffer 1968 - 2023

Mark Robert Shaffer, 54, arrived in this world on August 18, 1968 in Denver, Colorado. Born to Margaret Louise and Robert Dennis Shaffer, Mark was the "older" twin by four minutes with his brother Arthur following closely in his footsteps. Mark attended Central Missouri State University in Warrensburg, Missouri, and earned his Baccalaureate.

Throughout Mark's youth, he was immersed in scouting. Growing up, he eagerly looked forward to his summer camp at the Bartle Reservation near Clinton, Missouri. When he was old enough, he even worked for a number of years at H. Roe Bartle Boy Scout summer camp as a swim instructor and eventually achieved Scouting's highest honor, Eagle Scout. Mark decided to pursue a career in telecommunications and technology, working first at Sprint in Overland Park, Kansas, and then at HCL



and Microsoft in Seattle, Washington. Mark was a proud member of the Episcopal Church of the Holy Cross in Redmond,

Washington, where he sang in the choir. In addition, Mark embraced his family heritage through the Sons of the American Revolution and spent many weekends volunteering with the Kairos Prison Ministry Foundation. Mark is preceded in death by his grandparents, Arthur and Frances Watson, and his mother Margaret Nygren. He is survived by his daughter Zoey Shaffer, father Robert Shaffer, twin brother Arthur Shaffer (Linda), Logan, Victoria, Uncle Fred (Mary) Watson.





Mark Doherty Mitchell, a man of resilience and unwavering spirit, passed away in Seattle, Washington, in 2023. Born on March 23, 1947, in Seattle, Mark's life was marked by unique circumstances that made him a captivating and cherished individual. Serving in the Navy, Mark embarked on journeys across the Western Pacific, including Hawaii and Vietnam. It was during his second tour in Vietnam, anchored in Danang harbor, that he was exposed to the harmful effects of Agent Orange. Despite these challenges, Mark explored numerous countries, including Japan, the Philippines, Hong Kong, Thailand, North and South Vietnam, and both North and South Korea. Returning to Washington, he resumed his studies at the University of Washington, earning degrees in Urban Planning and Public Administration.



Sadly, Mark's exposure to Agent Orange resulted in several illnesses that ultimately led to his passing. His battle with diabetes, heart and kidney failure serves as a testament to his strength and endurance.

#### Cascade Centennial Chapter

During the past few months, it's been a busy time for Cascade Centennial:

- Youth programs. We submitted candidates for state competition in four categories: Eagle Scout Essay, Enhanced JROTC, Knight Essay, and the new Youth Video Contest. At the State level, our Enhanced JROTC nominee, Cadet Eowyn Ream, won first place and one of the two Youth Video Contest candidates that we recruited placed second. As always, our Eagle Scout contest led by chapter coordinator Greg Emerson had a very competitive candidate, and for the first time in several years, Knight Essay chapter coordinator Fred Templin produced four nominees for our chapter competition.
- Flag Certificates. After several years of relatively low involvement, we are making a push towards presenting more Flag Certificates to those who fly the US Flag on a continuing basis following appropriate protocols. Our chapter goal this year is to present 15 certificates, and we are well on our way to doing that.
- Fire Safety Commendation Medal. In response to reaching out to the Bellevue Fire Department, Chief Hagen has identified a candidate, Recruit Firefighter Bradford Carman, for the SAR Fire Safety Commendation Medal. We will present the medal at a Bellevue fire station this summer in front of the recipient's colleagues. Firefighter Carman, while off duty, is credited with saving lives in a head-on collision earlier this year. Presenting more community awards is another of our chapter's goals for 2023.

## Spokane #1 Chapter

On 22 May, Iris Cantlon, of the DAR, presented the "Flag Museum" with a Betsy Ross Flag over 100 years old. It is a coffin flag (5-foot X 9-foot) that she inherited. She said it was her husband's first wife's grandmother's flag. We believe it was used for a funeral in 1876. It is too large to display so it is being put in a display case with a picture next to it.

#### WASHINGTON FAMILY IMPACT ON WASHINGTON STATE

Bushrod Corbin Washington II arrived on a train in Spokane Washington in 1908. Accompanying him was his wife, Emma, son Nathaniel, daughters Peachy, Hannah Lee, Jane and a large trunk. His other son James had arrived a few years earlier.

Bushrod Corbin Washington II was the son of Thomas Blackburn Washington and grandson of Bushrod Corbin Washington I. Bushrod Corbin Washington I was the grandson of John Augustine Washington, brother to George Washington. After the Civil War, only 4 of 12 male Washington family members survived. Bushrod Corbin Washington II had inherited much of the Washington family holdings including the "Claymont Plantation". Claymont was 16,000 square feet with 59 rooms and 29 fireplaces. Due to debt owed by the Washington family from the Civil War Bushrod had to sell the plantation and move on. He managed to build up several businesses in West Virginia, but he was looking for a place to start new beginnings. Washington State was the perfect place. After settling in Washington State for a year he purchased land near Almira Washington, next to where the current Grand Coulee Dam is. With his wife and other family members he acquired more land by the homestead act.

The first year they lived in a tent as they waited for logs to be floated down the Columbia River to build a log home and corrals.

Soon Bushrod, Emma, James and Peachy settled in and they started growing apples and raising cattle. The new home would be called "Washington Flats". "Washington Flats" is now part of the 22,000 Big Bend Wildlife Area, open to the public. Access is just below Grand Coulee Dam. Washington Flats on the south side of the Columbia River (right side)

Nathaniel had earned his law degree while living in West Virginia and was now a lawyer in Almira, WA. Bushrod wrote back to his friends In West Virginia praising how wonderful the soil was. It would grow anything and soon more homesteaders were headed to Washington State from Virginia/West Virginia.

Soon the family would be beset with one tragedy after another. Bushrod Corbin Washington II would die in the 1919 flu epidemic. Two of his daughters would also die. In 1926 during a family picnic at "Washington Flats", Nathaniel, after stepping in hole while swimming in the river was swept downstream, James and Peachy attempted to rescue him and all three drowned. James was found the next day and Nathaniel and Peachy were found two weeks later 40 miles downstream. Standing on the shore watching in horror was Emma and Nathaniel's son Nathaniel Jr. Nathaniel junior had to ride a horse for over an hour back to Almira for help. But it was too late. Emma Washington would die in 1930 in Ephrata Washington. All the Washington family members are buried in the Almira Cemetery. There are also headstone memorials in Jefferson County West Virginia, for 70 Washington Family members at the Zion Episcopal Church, including a memorial for Bushrod Corbin Washington II.

Nathaniel senior had been working to get a dam built on the Columbia River for irrigation in Eastern Washington. Thanks to his efforts a Dam was built, Grand Coulee Dam. Recently the third generator room at Grand Coulee dam was named the Nathaniel Washington generator room. Nathaniel Junior would go on to graduate from the University of Washington with a Law degree. He would later serve 6 terms as a

senator from Washington State. Thanks to his efforts two more Dams were built on the Columbia River, Wanapum Dam and Priest Rapids Dam. When you cross over the Columbia River at Vantage look downstream and you will see the Wanapum

Dam, Priest Rapids Dam is below it. Nathaniel junior would serve in WWII and was present at the Nuremberg War Crimes Trials. After the war he became the prosecuting attorney for Douglas County, Washington. Here he built a home across from the Court House and it is now an event center and museum for Washington Family history. The event center is available for rent. In the trunk that accompanied Bushrod Washington II when he arrived in 1908, were artifacts from George Washington, paintings of the early Washington family members and deed records for the Washington family including records of over 500 slaves dating back to the 1600's. Most of these



artifacts were sold in 2006 but some remain in the Nat Washington House (check it out on Facebook). Two sons of Nat Washington are still alive (Tom & Nat) and live in the Seattle area. They have retained all the Washington family Bibles. In conclusion the next time you turn on the lights, thank the Washington family for the hydroelectric power they help create for Washington residents. Also, the next time you have a beer, wine or an apple thank the Washington family for creating the irrigation water to provide those products.


